FUN FACTS:

1. Filming started on April 15, 1946 and ended on July 27, 1946, exactly on deadline.
2. *It's a Wonderful Life* was nominated for five Oscars without winning any, but the film has since been recognized by the American Film Institute as one of the 100 best American films ever made, and placed number one on AFI's most inspirational American films of all time.
3. Vincent Price was considered for the role of Mr. Potter; Ginger Rogers and Jean Arthur for the role of Mary, and Cary Grant for the role of George Bailey.
4. In 1947, an FBI analyst submitted, an addition to a running memo on "Communist infiltration of the motion picture industry," recording the opinion of an industry source who said that the film's "obvious" attempt to discredit bankers "is a common trick used by Communists."
5. There are only two surviving locations from the film. The first is the swimming pool. It is located in the gymnasium at Beverly Hills High School and is still in operation as of 2008. The second is the "Martini home", at 4587 Viro Road in La Cañada Flintridge, California.
