

Boxed Set

You were ready for Freddie. Are you meltin' for Elton?

Often, when two similar movies come out back to back it dampens your enthusiasm for at least one of them. Think of *Antz* and *A Bug's Life, The Truman Show* and *EDtv, Armageddon* and *Deep Impact, Churchill* and *Darkest Hour,* even the two documentaries about the fun-to-hate Fyre festival that came out this past winter.

And yet, I don't feel that way about Bohemian Rhapsody and Rocketman. In fact, the success of the first, the Freddie Mercury bio-pic that earned four Oscars, including Best Actor for star Rami Malek, just makes me more excited about the second, this month's Elton John story with Taron Egerton stepping into those crazy platform shoes.

Although there are clearly similarities — both films are about larger-than-life, gay, British rock icons (born less than a year apart) — they seem less like competing projects and more like companion pieces within the same cinematic universe. Like Marvel, only more marvellous.

To start, it was *Rocketman* director Dexter Fletcher who was called in to finish *Bohemian Rhapsody* after that film's director was fired a few weeks from the end of shooting.

The productions also share a number of crew, most notably costume designer Julian Day, a crucial role on both pics. And they have at least one character in common. John Reid, played by Aidan Gillen in *Bohemian Rhapsody* and Richard Madden in *Rocketman*, managed both Queen and Elton John at different points, and was Elton's lover for years.

But, most importantly, Freddie and Elton were great friends in real life. Such

great friends that while he was dying Mercury managed to send John one last Christmas present, a painting that arrived weeks after Freddie had passed. "I was overcome, 44 years old at the time, crying like a child," recalled John in his book *Love is the Cure*.

And about five months after Freddie's death, when the top musical acts of the day came together for the monumental Freddie Mercury Tribute Concert for AIDS Awareness on April 20th, 1992, who do you think got to sing "Bohemian Rhapsody" with the remaining members of Queen? That's right, Elton John.

Of course, there are major differences between the films too; starting with the fact that Egerton sings his own songs whereas Malek, for the most part, did not. Turn to page 38 for "Shining Star," our interview with **Taron Egerton** about singing, and behaving, like Elton John.

It's all about an American election, but *Long Shot* was filmed right here in Canada with oodles of northern connections

ONG SHOT MAY JUST BE THE MOST Canadian movie ever made about American politics.

Aside from starring Vancouver native Seth Rogen as Fred Flarsky, an American journalist/speechwriter for Charlotte Field (Charlize Theron), the U.S. Secretary of State who's running for President, the political rom-com was shot mostly in Montreal.

The Sun Life Building, for example, was transformed into the U.S. Department of State, and when they needed to film a scene inside the White House they repurposed an old Oval Office set from one of the X-Men movies shot in the city.

Rogen co-produced the pic with his longtime creative partner Evan Goldberg, also from Vancouver, and best of all the film casts Swedish Alexander Skarsgård as the sexy Canadian Prime Minister, James Steward, who bears an undeniable resemblance to our own PM, Justin Trudeau.

One big difference between Steward and Trudeau is that the fictitious Prime Minister is single. That lack of attachmen allows him to pursue Field, whose handlers would much rather she date the charismatic leader (poll numbers will soar!) than Flarksy, the scruffy but lovable schlub Charlotte used to babysit when they were kids.

By the way, that younger version of Charlotte the babysitter is played by another Canadian, Markham, Ontario's Aviva Mongillo, whom we interview on page 14. –**MW**



FULL OF MOXY

Singer **Kelly Clarkson** has sold 25-million albums worldwide, but now she puts her pipes to use voicing Moxy in the animated feature *UglyDolls*. Cheerful Moxy leads a group of misshapen dolls out of Uglyville to the town of Perfection, where all dolls must be perfect so they can find a child to love them. That's also the dream for Moxy and her friends, who are judged harshly for their imperfections. **INGRID RANDOJA** spoke with Clarkson on the line from her home in Nashville, where she was lying in bed after a long night prepping for her upcoming tour.

Describe Moxy, who is she?

"Man, she is just hope in a bottle. She's kind of the cheerleader of the whole Uglyville camp and is so optimistic, working towards something that everybody else has kind of let go of and thinks is a hopeless dream."

Do you see something of yourself in Moxy?

"Yeah, she kind of reminds me of me when I was a kid. I grew up in a very small town with very humble beginnings. I had a dream of singing one day but people around me were like, 'That's a pipe dream.' But for me it was real, it was totally obtainable, and so she represents this never-ending hope that it could happen."

Did you enjoy doing voiceover work? It can be physically tiring.

"I mean, if you know me at all, I'm very physical in general, just my mannerisms, so it wasn't a stretch for me to be physical in the studio. I do that with singing as well. I get really into it when I'm in the studio. But it was just fun, it was just a different avenue of creativity I really haven't been able to explore."

And like anyone in the spotlight you must relate to the film's message that

we shouldn't judge people on how they look or what they wear.

"Yeah, in society, and especially in this industry, it's just so driven by aesthetics. I'm not against aesthetics, I get it, I love beauty, I love art, but at the same time this movie is just a reminder that beauty is in the eye of the beholder. I know that sounds really silly, but whatever is perfect for one person may not be for someone else. The movie is a celebration of someone that maybe stands out in a different way."

A Young Charlize?

Aviva Mongillo plays the young version of Charlize Theron's character in *Long Shot*

OR ONE DAY AVIVA MONGILLO KNEW WHAT IT FELT like to be Charlize Theron. The 21-year-old Markham, Ontario, native best known for her role on TV's *Backstage* portrays the teenage version of Theron in the comedy *Long Shot*, a political rom-com that earned rave reviews when it premiered at the SXSW Film Festival in March.

Theron plays Charlotte Field, the U.S. Secretary of State who is running for President and hires the goofy Fred Flarsky (Seth Rogen) — whom she used to babysit when they were young — to be her speechwriter. Mongillo, who plays Charlotte the babysitter, says stepping into Theron's shoes felt right.

"I know her, I know her work, and I felt I could carry it well," says Mongillo on the line from Markham where she lives her parents.

How did you get this role?

They asked me to send in an audition tape. You kinda have to look like Charlize, and I had been told before that I resemble her, which was a huge compliment. And I thought, "Oh my goodness, I know I have a shot at this, I could get this." I sent in the audition tape, I didn't hear anything so I thought I didn't get it, but I thought I did so well, and I was pretty disappointed. Then, after they started production, they told me I booked it and flew me to Montreal.

Do you have a favourite Theron movie?

That's difficult. The first time I ever saw her was in the movie *Hancock*. I love her in that movie, and I really loved her last movie, *Tully*. It was supercute.

You shot your scene in a single day. How did you feel on set?

My focus the whole time was don't be dumb, don't say something stupid, be professional. I was nervous the whole day but at the end of it I remember having a pinch-myself moment. It was such a great day on set and I really felt confident with what we had done so I am looking forward to seeing the final result. And the movie itself looks like it's going to be hilarious.

JOHN WICK annotated

If you haven't seen the first two John Wick movies you may feel lost reading about the third, **John Wick: Chapter 3 - Parabellum**¹, so we've annotated our interview with star **Keanu Reeves** in the hopes that everyone can understand. As John Wick: Chapter 2 ended, our lethal protagonist John Wick (Keanu Reeves) was on the run, literally, after a global bounty worth \$14-million was placed on his head. In anticipation of the third film, **TANNER ZIPCHEN** sat down with Reeves in Los Angeles

First, is the dog okay?

 The dog² [pauses for dramatic effect] is okay.

Going into the second sequel, how do we step it up from the one prior?

I think the way that the story is evolving actually led to it expanding. We wanted to open up the world of the Continental³ and open up the world that we were introduced to in *Chapter 2* of the High Table⁴. With

chapter 2 of the High Table⁴. With that, it brought other characters and other consequences...from *Chapter 2*, which was the excommunicado⁵, – which means he gets no services from the Continental, no help. [Add in] the open contracts, or the people after him to kill him, and then this story is about John surviving. And we introduce a new character from the High Table called the Adjudicator⁶ who is going to adjudicate. And this is not only about John Wick, but now Winston⁷ at the – Continental, did he break rules? 3. A hotel exclusively for members of the underworld where the most important rule is that no killing can happen on its property.

5. At the end of *Chapter 2* Wick is excommunicated from the Continental for breaking its cardinal rule and killing crime lord Santino D'Antonio on its property.

7. Played by lan McShane, Winston runs the Continental Hotel and breaks the rules in *Chapter 2* by giving Wick a one-hour head start before excommunicating him and triggering the global bounty on his head.



JOHN WICK: CHAPTER 3 – PARABELLUM OPENS MAY 17TH



We've seen the training videos from the previous films, are we going to see another one for this film?

I don't know. I continued working with Taran Butler⁸, who trained me for the weapons.... There's still the judo, jujitsu, some aikido and other techniques and then also there's a sequence where I'm riding a horse and doing some trick riding.... I really enjoy doing physical action; the connection that can potentially bring with an audience.

With John Wick you've got the gun fu⁹, as well. Do you ever feel like more of a dancer when you're on set?

Yeah, definitely dance, because we call it fight choreography, right? So it is dancing, it is what all of that entails. It's not just you, it's you amongst others, it's other people with you, it's the camera work. All of these things are going into the cooperation to do this dance and to tell the story.

Is the suit you're wearing today wardrobe from John Wick?

No, this is Keanu's personal wardrobe.

Do you get to keep the wardrobe?

I don't.


You'll have to work that out in the contract for the next one.

Well, I have to wear the suit¹⁰; they have to take care of it. That's actually been one of the rare but cool experiences. After we did the first film and we had the opportunity to continue the story in *Chapter 2*, I put on, literally, the same suit. And then from *Chapter 2* to doing *Chapter 3*, I put on the same suit, and there was something kind of, you know, time has gone by but then you're putting the character back on, and then John's in his armour, and let's go.

We talk with Mena Massoud about his stab-in-thedark audition tape for Aladdin's title role, and why he managed to get the part over a bunch of big-name stars

T WAS THE CASTING CALL HEARD round the world.

In 2016, when Disney decided it would make a live-action version of its 1992 animated hit Aladdin, it understood there could be no Hollywood whitewashing. Director Guy Ritchie and the studio needed to find actors of Middle Eastern descent to populate the film set in the fictional ancient kingdom of Agrabah, where a street urchin named Aladdin releases a blue genie from its lamp and using one of his three wishes transforms into a prince to woo the independent-minded Princess Jasmine.

The producers issued a global casting call and Mena Massoud - born in Cairo, Egypt, but raised in the Toronto suburb of Markham - sent in an audition tape. And waited, and waited some more.





→ "The first tape was a shot in the dark. It was like, 'Of course I'm gonna do it, because that's what I do as an actor,' says 27-year-old Massoud on the line from Los Angeles where he's lived for the past two years. Months passed and it became clear the filmmakers were having trouble finding their Aladdin, passing on actors such as Riz Ahmed, Dev Patel and other more established stars.

"They spent months and months trying to find a singer who could act the role, and I think they slowly came to realize that what they really needed was a strong actor who could pull off the singing, and not vice versa," he says.

We must remember that, aside from being a robust adventure story and romance, *Aladdin* is also a musical that includes the well-known songs "Friend Like Me" and the Oscar-winning "A Whole New World."

Jonathan Eirich, one of *Aladdin*'s producers, noticed a photo of Massoud on the set of Amazon TV's *Jack Ryan*, in which Massoud plays Jack Ryan's (John Krasinski) CIA colleague, Tarek Kassar. They checked their store of tapes and found Massoud's audition.

"They had that tape for four months, but no one had seen it because that's not who they were looking for. I think they probably got over 10,000 submissions from around the world, and sometimes you just don't have the infrastructure to go through all of that."

That led to more auditions, which included two trips to London to work with a vocal coach and choreographer, and to make sure he had chemistry with Naomi Scott, who portrays his onscreen love interest, Princess Jasmine. And when he finally got word he'd landed the role Massoud could only think, "Sometimes the stars align, and when something's kind of meant for you no one can get in the way of that."

LADDIN WAS FILMED OVER seven months on grand sets built in Surrey, England, and on location in the desserts of Jordan. Will Smith rounds out the cast in the pivotal role of the big, blue, wisecracking Genie. The filmmakers used CGI to create Smith's towering figure, but that didn't stop the star from making his presence felt on set.



ASSOUD WAS BORN IN CAIRO, Egypt, and immigrated to Canada when he was three years old. His family settled in Markham, Ontario, where Mena began acting in school plays at St. Patrick Catholic Elementary School and even served as the captain of his theatre improv team at Brother André High School. However, he believed his passion would be short-lived.

"Coming from an immigrant family I was taught, 'You can't be an artist as a profession. That's something that you do as a hobby," he recalls. "I went to the University of Toronto for neuroscience for a year because I thought I was going to be a doctor, and I was sitting in calculus class one day and it kind of just hit me that I wasn't going to be able to do something that I was passionate about for the rest of my life.

"So, I left that day. I contacted my high school drama teacher, who I'm still very close with, and said, 'Listen, I want to audition for theatre school.' I set up to audition for theatre schools across Canada, got accepted at Ryerson University, and I don't think I looked back since that point." While his parents continue to worry about Massoud's career choice — "My dad still thinks I should get my Master's and teach acting," says Massoud with a laugh — the young actor knows his timing is perfect as Hollywood is finally getting the message that diverse movie casts are crucial to scoring with global audiences.

"One of the things I'm most proud of is the visibly ethnic representation this film provides," says Massoud. "I think people really celebrate it when it's an all-Black cast or an all-Asian cast, and that's amazing, we should definitely celebrate that, but with this film I think we kind of go beyond that.

"I'm Egyptian-Canadian, Naomi is British-Indian and Marwan Kenzari, who plays [sorcerer] Jafar, is Tunisian-Dutch." And throw in 500 extras from a range of diverse backgrounds and you've got a multicultural spectacle. Massoud got a taste of that diversity while filming halfway across the world.

"When I went to Jordan there was a little bit of a language barrier as we had a local crew, and had local Bedouins handling the camels," he remembers, "and they didn't speak anything but Arabic and I was able to speak Arabic to them, and just getting to learn about them and their culture was amazing."

HILE MASSOUD HAS SPENT the past year travelling the world for his roles in Jack Ryan and Aladdin, he's also spent time back in Toronto shooting the Rob Ford drama Run This Town, which debuted at this year's SXSW Film Festival and casts Massoud as a fictional aide to Toronto's crack-smoking mayor, Ford (Damian Lewis). Getting the chance to work at home is important for Massoud, who is determined to lend a hand to fellow Toronto actors.

"I think it's important we all support each other and celebrate each other," he says, "and I'm trying to start a foundation that helps support visibly ethnic artists in Toronto, helping to break down some barriers."

It's a wish this big-screen Aladdin doesn't need a genie to grant.



That's **Taron Egerton** doing his best Elton John in *Rocketman*, which tracks the meteoric rise of one of rock music's most enduring performers. And by all accounts, Egerton's best Elton John is pretty damn good, including singing all of his own songs. No problem, says the young star, except for that one tune...

LTON JOHN HAS SAID ON MORE THAN ONE occasion that he should not be alive. The 72-year-old pop star didn't just dabble in sex, drugs and rock 'n' roll, he dove in headfirst and was lucky to surface.

So, when it came to making a bio-pic of his life, John wanted a film that would not only celebrate his memorable music, but also capture the craziness that surrounded his rise to stardom.

It was that notion that excited Taron Egerton, the 29-year-old Welsh actor who was chosen to portray Elton John in *Rocketman*, directed by Dexter Fletcher (the same director who finished shooting *Bohemian Rhapsody* after Bryan Singer was fired).

"*Rocketman* is sort of a musical fantasy on Elton's life with some moments of psychedelia," says Egerton on the line from London. "It was always the mandate that

we were going to make something that was true to his experience and, frankly, I was never really interested in doing another version of this. It's about him recounting his life from the therapy room, so it would be wrong to not explore the darker aspects of his life.

"At the same time, we want it to be a celebration of his life in music so I hope people will find it joyous. But yeah, the story arc is of a man who nearly f--ks it all up."

The film sees musical prodigy Reginald Dwight (Elton John's real name) encouraged by his mum (Bryce Dallas Howard) to follow his dream of making music. Dwight meets lyricist Bernie Taupin (Jamie Bell), and their partnership results in the newly named Elton John becoming a global pop star famed for his over-the-top costumes and outlandish behaviour. It's John's growing addiction to drugs and alcohol, and the fact he has to hide his homosexuality

including his longterm relationship with manager John Reid
 (Richard Madden) — that nearly costs him his life.

LIKE THE QUEEN BIO-PIC BOHEMIAN RHAPSODY,

Rocketman took years to get off the ground. John announced back in 2012 that he was developing a film about his life and wanted to be played by Justin Timberlake. When that didn't pan out Tom Hardy was cast in the role, and when he left the project, Egerton — who met John when the pop star filmed a cameo for *Kingsman: The Golden Circle* — was offered the part.



No offense to Timberlake and Hardy, but Egerton really is the perfect choice; not only does he bear a resemblance to the younger John, he can sing. It's his voice you hear singing all the songs in *Rocketman*.

"I feel that there is something of Elton in me, the capacity to be quite a big personality," says Egerton with a laugh. "That sort of juxtaposition of two extremes sort of exists within myself. And then there's the musical element as well. Singing has been a part of my life for a long time and I've been kind of yearning for an opportunity to really flex that muscle."

EGERTON WAS BORN IN BIRKENHEAD, MERSEYSIDE, JUST outside Liverpool, but moved to Wales when he was a child. He started acting as a teenager and at age 19 was accepted into the prestigious Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts. Upon graduating he landed his first movie — and first starring role — as young spy Eggsy in the 2014 hit *Kingsman: The Secret Service*.

It was two years later that he revealed his singing voice on screen, performing the end credits song (with OMD and Hugh Jackman) for his film *Eddie the Eagle*, and then playing Johnny the singing gorilla in the animated musical *Sing*.

Rocketman sees Egerton performing a plethora of Elton John hits. Asked if he has a favourite, he says it's just too hard to choose.

"I love singing 'Bennie and the Jets' and I love singing 'Your Song' and I love singing 'Saturday Night's Alright for Fighting," he says, listing three of John's biggest hits. "I mean, different ones for different reasons. 'Tiny Dancer' is actually one of the ones that I find harder to sing and that's the one in the movie trailer. I actually performed it with Elton the other night at his Oscar party. It's not the one I would have chosen to sing first because it's not the one I feel most confident singing, but I actually had a great time in the end."

IT'S HARD FOR EGERTON TO GET HIS HEAD AROUND THE fact that not only is he portraying Elton John in a big-buzz movie, he has become friends with the icon. "It feels kind of f--king surreal to me," he admits.

Yet his casting also raised some eyebrows since Egerton is straight and John is gay. Some wondered if the young actor would feel comfortable honestly exploring John's sexuality. Egerton says that is not a problem.

"One of the things I'm most proud of about the film is that it feels very gay," he states. "For me there's already touchy ground as a heterosexual man playing a gay man. I was acutely aware that if I were to have any integrity playing this role, that I had to push the envelope in terms of making sure that my performance felt authentically gay.

"And I am very at peace with that," he says. "One thing that I really love about *Rocketman* is that Elton's main relationship is with John Reid, who is played by Richard Madden. And although it is well-documented that relationship went into something of a spiral, what I love is the way we handled their first meeting, their first moment of intimacy. I think it's done with tenderness, beauty and love."

Rocketman could well send Egerton's career into orbit, and for the actor who turns 30 in November, the timing is just right.

"You make lots of mistakes in your 20s and I feel like you learn a lot about yourself," says Egerton, "and although I'm only probably a third of the way through this journey that we call life, I feel like I'm starting to know myself better. I feel more settled and less anxious than I ever have been.

"My 20s have been so fantastic in terms of opportunity, with working with Matthew [Vaughn] on the *Kingsman* films and various other roles I've done, but I definitely would like to feel like I'm moving towards playing men rather than boys in my 30s."




