## WHERE HAVE YOU GONE, LEO DICAPRI

verybody's talking about Leonardo DiCaprio's nearly threeyear hiatus from movies. But that's a bit of a fallacy. Although the Hollywood heartthrob hasn't had a flick out since The Beach hit theatres in February 2000, he started working on Martin Scorsese's period piece Gangs of New York just six months later.

But the shoot was long, at eight months, post-production was complicated, and then came September 11th, after which anything



remotely related to New York became too sensitive to touch. The studio delayed the movie until July 2002, and it was bumped yet again when they realized that would mean going headto-head with another period pic, Tom Hanks's Road to Perdition.

So Leo's fans were denied until this month, when he appears not only in Gangs, but also with Hanks in Steven Spielberg's Catch Me if You Can, filmed earlier this year. For "Return of the King," page 40, DiCaprio recalls the Gangs shoot, and defends himself against accusations that his partying got in the way of the production.

We've also got Steven Spielberg talking about Catch Me if You Can. Well, sort of. If you've ever read an interview with an actor appearing in a Spielberg film you'll know the secretive director makes his cast sign contracts swearing not to reveal plot details. So imagine how tough it is to get the man himself to crack. But that's okay. As you'll see in "Spielberg Speaks," page 32, there are other interesting things you can discuss with him.

From one of Hollywood's most-esteemed directors to a newbie stepping behind the camera for the first time. Yet, this first-time director has a name that's just about as recognizable as Spielberg's. In "Denzel's Debut," page 38, Denzel Washington takes you through the history of his first directing experience, Antwone Fisher, from the day he signed his name to a napkin/contract to how it feels to be just an actor again on his first post-Antwone Fisher project.

ishma Malik has lived and worked in Hong Kong, Mumbai, Los Angeles and New York City, but there is no place the practicing Buddhist would rather be this Christmas than at home with her family in Richmond Hill, Ontario.

"I think we started celebrating
Christmas when I stated to the family that
we should," laughs Malik, one of the stars
of last month's Bollywood Hollywood.
"Since then it's been a very important
holiday to the family. In years that I've
been out of town I've made sure that I've
been home for it."

Celebrating a Christian tradition is something Malik's South Asian character in her next film, Expecting Shanti, might do. In the feature, which begins production in California next month, Malik plays a modern woman working as a magazine fashion editor whose life is turned upside down when her traditional Indian aunt comes to visit. Malik says she can relate. In fact, she swears she's had to do research to play Indian women in films like Bollywood Hollywood.

"I haven't lived the true Indian experi-

ence because I grew up with very liberal parents and my cultural references were so outside of what was Indian," explains Malik, adding that she's never even had an Indian boyfriend.

"I rebelled against it but it also wasn't pushed on me. My sense of culture seems to come more from the Canadian side of me. In some ways when I went to India I felt so strange. It took me a while to understand that this is where I was from."

Malik, a former Miss India-Canada who worked as a VJ on an Asian music network, credits some of her openness to Western culture to her father, who encouraged her to pursue her dreams. "Here's a man who is so talented and gifted. He is such a closet artist," she gushes. "He's a man who has been so supportive of my career. Most Indian fathers? Oh my God, they're strict. I was like, 'Dad, I want to take dance classes,' and he was like, 'Okay!' My dad used to sit down with me and we used to press "play" and "record" on the tape deck and talk into the tape deck and sing songs."

After wrapping Bollywood Hollywood

last year, Malik took acting courses at the William Esper Studio in New York City, where she managed to land a leading role in the forthcoming *Flavors*, a movie about love, romance and arranged marriages in the South Asian community. Although she's anxious for a part that's not based on her ethnicity, Malik realizes she's got an edge in the highly competitive acting business.

"Had I been blond I wouldn't be getting the opportunities to play leading roles in things. I'd be up against many, many good actresses," she says. "For now it's what is coming in front of me and it's what I've got to do in order to learn all the tricks of the trade. When I really bust out it's going to be a role that's not about my ethnicity."


That role could be just around the corner. Malik recently auditioned to play a character named June McAllister — a rather non-Indian surname — on the small screen. "I don't really want to do TV but the fact that this casting director said 'you've got the chops to play this part and your ethnicity doesn't matter...' to me that's respect."

It focuses on Barris's secret life, in which he supposedly worked as an assassin for the CIA (director George Clooney plays the agent who recruits him).


What's It About? Inspired by Michael Cunningham's Pulitzer Prizewinning homage to Virginia Woolf's Mrs. Dalloway, this drama tells three stories: In 1923, Woolf (Kidman) suffers from depression while writing her book. In 1949, a housewife (Julianne Moore) is so taken by the book she neglects the planning of her husband's birthday party. In present day, a woman (Streep) throws a party for her dying friend (Ed Harris) who nicknamed her Mrs. Dalloway.

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
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**Now appearing in...**the second *Lord of the Rings* movie, *The Two Towers*, as Aragorn, the reluctant human hero who, as the movie begins, has been separated from Frodo, the hobbit he's sworn to protect.

Bio bits: If you wrote a script about a guy who was not only inhumanly beautiful but also a world-class actor, published poet, noted painter and photographer, your audience would balk. It's not believable, they'd snicker. But all of that (plus a childhood lived all over the world and a marriage to a punk rock star) is true of Viggo Mortensen.

Born in Manhattan on October 20, 1958, to a Danish father and American mother, Mortensen didn't stay in New York State for long. When he was only two, his father moved the family (Viggo has two brothers) to South America to run a business. They traveled back and forth between Argentina and Venezuela until Viggo was 11 and his parents divorced. That's when mom moved the kids back to New York.

At high school he was captain of the swim

and tennis teams, and was known for carrying his camera everywhere, snapping shots of anything he found interesting. He went on to study government and Spanish at St. Lawrence University in Canton, N.Y., and then moved to Denmark for a while, where he lived with his cousins and worked odd jobs like selling flowers on the street, driving a fork lift and waiting tables. In 1982, he followed a thengirlfriend back to New York, which is when he decided to become an actor.

After two years at the Warren Robertson Acting Workshop, Mortensen started doing plays and getting roles in small films like 1985's Witness and the 1987 underground pic Salvation! opposite punk rock icon Exene Cervenka, lead singer for the band X. The pair fell in love, got married, and in 1988 had a son, Henry Blake. They divorced in 1997 but remain great friends, often taking vacations together.

Aside from the third Lord of the Rings movie, Return of the King, Mortensen's 2003 schedule includes the drama Hidalgo in which he once again mounts a trusty steed as real-life long-distance rider Frank T. Hopkins.

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



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








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## screen test

## ...BUT DON'T EXPECT HIM TO SAY MUCH ABOUT HIS LATEST FLICK CATCH ME IF YOU CAN. THE ÜBER-POWERFUL DIRECTOR HAS A THING ABOUT REVEALING TOO MANY DETAILS BEFORE OPENING WEEKEND I BY EARL DITTMAN

hen a movie fan knows too much about a film before they even walk into the theatre, it ruins their whole sense of wonderment and adventure and makes it a less enjoyable experience," says Steven Spielberg. "There's no feeling more pure than that of being surprised by what they see on the screen.... If I had one wish, it would be that audiences just knew the title of the film. That way, they would have no preconceived notions of what they were going to see and they would enjoy it so much more."

For that reason, you will find out precious little about the new Leonardo DiCaprio, Tom Hanks drama Catch Me if You Can in this interview with its director. From him, anyway.

Fortunately, the film is based on the true story of 1960s con artist Frank Abagnale Jr., so we know a bit about the plot. Featuring DiCaprio in the lead role, Catch Me if You Can follows the criminal exploits of the grifter in his teen years. An expert impersonator, Abagnale routinely passed himself off as a pilot, professor and physician, funding his extravagant lifestyle by forging and cashing millions worth of bad cheques. But the FBI caught on and formed a special task force to capture him. A composite of several real-life

operatives, Tom Hanks plays the young con's law enforcement nemesis who always seems to be one step away from making the big arrest.

"It's an incredibly interesting and entertaining story," Spielberg reluctantly responds when asked why he was drawn to the script. "It's not your typical cop chasing the bad guy movie. There's a lot of humour in Frank's adventures and how he was able to elude officials for so long. There's no real good or bad guys in the story. The lines are kind of blurred. That's what makes it fun to watch. But I don't want to tell you too much more and spoil the fun for you. You need to see it for yourself."

After adding that he always envisioned Leo and Tom in their roles ("They are absolutely perfect for their parts because, in a lot of ways, they are playing against type"), Spielberg politely asks if he can move on to another subject.

Dressed in a pair of wrinkled khaki pants, a matching shirt and a pair of boots ("It's my Indiana Jones look," he jokes), the director was more than happy to talk about other things — like finally graduating from university last spring, and life with his wife, actor Kate Capshaw, and their five children.

#### [Q] How do you keep yourself sane when you have your fingers in so many projects?

[A] "Who said I was sane? [laughs]."

#### [Q] But how do you stay on top of it all?

[A] "Well, for one thing, I don't run DreamWorks [the studio he co-founded], which is a popular misconception about me. DreamWorks is run by Jeffrey Katzenberg and David Geffen, my partners. When I first formed the company with them I said, 'Guys, I'm here to direct. I'm not here to run a company.' When I had Amblin, Kathy Kennedy ran it. I didn't run Amblin Entertainment. I'm the guy who goes out and makes the movies. Right away the huge component of what it takes to run a corporation was taken from me, and I love that I don't have to do that. So I have time to direct and to be a father."

#### [Q] And to get your bachelor's degree in film and electronic arts from California State Long Beach.

[A] "Yeah, I finally got my degree. It was great."

#### [Q] Congratulations. What are you going to do after your academic life?

[A] "I'm going into post-graduate counseling immediately."

#### [Q] Why was it important to get the degree after everything you've accomplished?

[A] "I had two years left. I had 42, 43 units to go when I dropped out of college to get the directing contract offered to me by Sid Sheinberg and the late Lew Wasserman. It was important for me to do it because my kids were already talking about not wanting to go to college because I didn't. I did well without having a degree and my older kids were beginning to talk like that, and that scared me."

#### [Q] What graduation gifts did you get?

[A] "I got a lot of books about panic attacks, post-graduation: how not to panic, how to get work, how to parlay your degree into a master's if you can't get work on your BA."

#### [Q] Did you have to write a paper?

[A] "I did."

#### [Q] What was it about?

[A] "I wrote a paper on marine biology off the California coast. I think it was seven, eight or 10 pages. I had to research it. Of course, I didn't know a lot about it. I had to take a course, read the professor's book."

#### [Q] Did you get to use Schindler's List or Saving Private Ryan for any of your classes?

[A] "Not Private Ryan. But Schindler's List fulfilled a humanities course, and Amistad fulfilled a black history course."

#### [Q] Did you get As?

[A] "I got As, except from the New York Times. They still give me a C+ on that [laughs]."

#### [Q] How do you keep your kids grounded?

[A] "I think a lot of how normal they are is based on the fact that they have strong friendships with kids who are, you know, deemed 'normal.' And that grounds them. I think their friends ground them even more than our lifestyle, and we have a very funky lifestyle. We don't have servants. We don't have people that come and make us dinner. I make breakfast every morning. My wife makes dinner every single night. We have a former nanny that helps my wife make dinner, named Francis, but this is how I was raised. My mother never had anybody. I have three younger sisters. My mom never had a staff helping us grow up. My mom did it all by herself. I think my wife, Kate — she's from the Midwest, she's from Missouri — has that sort of grass roots ethic about doing it herself."

#### [Q] At home, what are you really good at and what are you absolutely hopeless at?

[A] "I'm a great morning person in organizing all the kids and getting their lunches packed and getting them off to school. I'm Mr. Mom from about 6:30 a.m. — I do three car pools in the morning — to, like, 9:00. My wife is the real mom for the rest of the day, and the rest of the evening. What am I really bad at? Probably figuring out consequences for my kids when they do something wrong. I'm really bad at that. Not that I'm not tough enough, I'm just always short of ideas. My wife is a lot better in the creative consequence department than I am."

#### [Q] It's great to hear that a new Indiana Jones is finally going to be made. I think everyone's pretty excited about it.

[A] "Believe it or not, so am I. But I don't think we'll start shooting it until 2004. It's not coming out until 2005."

#### [Q] You've been trying to do it for a long time. How did it finally come together?

[A] "For the longest time I didn't like some of the ideas. Finally, a concept happened that I liked and Harrison Ford happened to like at the same time. It was only about the idea. George Lucas tells the stories, and I help write it. But George is the one who crystallizes what this adventure is particularly about. George was spinning off a lot of different ideas. It's kind of like he's the pitcher, and I'm the catcher. I can shake off a pitch. I can shake my head and say, 'Let's try something else.' And George came up with a pitch that Harrison and I thought was brilliant. So we looked at that one and hired



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


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Frank Darabont to come up with the rest of it."

#### [Q] What do you want to do next?

[A] "I'm actively looking for a musical right now. The good thing about a musical is you know how long the movie is going to be because there is a finite amount of minutes for each number. I've wanted to do one for years. I came close to turning a couple of films into musicals, but it never quite worked out. I had nine songs written by John Williams [for Hook]. I photographed two of them, and at John's request cut them out of the movie. John was the one who saw them cut together and said, 'This is not the right template for a musical.' So we abandoned nine months of work, and I just told the straight story of Captain Hook. I almost made 1941 into a musical. Johnny [Belushi] and I were going to make that into a musical, and that would have probably helped that movie."

#### [Q] You could make the next Indiana Jones a musical.

[A] "I guess he could sing a little bit. Let me give Harrison a call and see if he's ready to start dancing and singing lessons. I can just imagine his response [laughs]. But now that I think about it, maybe we can do this gigantic stage number with snakes, with Indy right in the middle of a big Busby Berkley dance number. Harrison's been telling me we really need to go out on a limb with the next one. Here's our chance." @

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


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## Antwone Fisher, the true story of a tormented sailor confronting his past, gives Denzel Washington his first shot behind the camera

t's only fitting that Denzel Washington is at Toronto's Four Seasons hotel talking to journalists about his new movie Antwone Fisher. It was in the hotel's bar two years ago that Fox Searchlight head Peter Rice convinced Washington — in town shooting John Q — to direct the poignant true story.

"He backed me into a corner and made me sign a contract, which I actually signed on a napkin," recalls Washington just hours before the world premiere of his directorial debut at the Toronto International Film Festival. "I said: 'I promise I will do this after Training Day."

The film was written by Antwone Fisher, a former Sony Pictures security guard, based on his best-selling autobiography Finding Fish. It's the story of his life as a troubled young sailor (played by newcomer Derek Luke) who is encouraged to confront his past and search for the family that abandoned him. After years of abuse as a child, Fisher turns to a life of crime before joining the Navy, where his violent outbursts and lack of respect for authority put him face to face with a Navy psychiatrist (Washington). It is this shrink and Fisher's girlfriend (Joy Bryant), who convince him to find his

family and conquer his demons.

In terms of directorial style, Washington chose to focus squarely on the characters. "I wanted it to be a simple, honest story because that's what it is," he explains.

Washington first saw a script for the film in 1997 but felt it needed a lot of work and consulted with Fisher on as many as 70 rewrites. "I've learned from some of the films that I've been in that just because it's important to you doesn't mean that people are going to care about it. Just because it's true doesn't mean it's interesting," he explains. "We had to apply that to the material and make sure that we fashioned a decent screenplay. Trust me, we only cover about 40 percent of what he's gone through. I mean, it was so much, and so



rough, that we were like, 'We'll never get anybody in the theatre.' Some of the earlier scripts...it was relentless."

Although Washington directed, produced and starred in the film, he insists it's Fisher's story. "The last thing I wanted to do was draw attention to myself. I said it throughout the filming and even before that — it's about the boy," says Washington. "The story is about him. It's not about my debut."

Still, much of the attention the film is getting centres on Washington as a first-time director. But, for the veteran actor, standing behind the camera was no big deal. "I've been studying directors for 20 some odd years. I've worked with the best," he says. "I didn't realize how much I knew. I've made a lot of films, I know a lot about making films, I just never had to apply it until now."

The hardest part, he adds, was acting in his own movie. "Having to jump in and jump out — I didn't care for it so much. It was tough."

Luke, a former Sony studios gift shop clerk and friend of Fisher's, delivered an emotional and convincing performance. "The only thing I came in to the film with was a heart," says Luke. "I prayed and said if I can just deliver my heart maybe I can do justice to everybody."

Since Washington has played a number of real people in his career (Rubin Carter in 1999's *The Hurricane*, Herman Boone in 2000's *Remember the Titans* and the titular *Malcolm X* in 1992) he helped Luke get into his role by, initially, keeping Fisher away from the set. "I know what that pressure is to play a real person," he explains. "I wanted to give Derek the opportunity to have a day or two under his belt before Antwone came on the set."

Washington's next movie, Out of Time, is scheduled to hit theatres next summer. He'll play the police chief of a small Florida town who borrows money from the evidence room so he can run away with the woman (Sanaa Lathan) with whom he's in love. Shot last summer, it was his first job after finishing Antwone Fisher.

"It was interesting going back to acting because I was like, 'I've got a few ideas.' It was hard keeping my mouth shut," he jokes. "But it was like a paid vacation because I didn't have to worry about it. 'I'll be in my trailer, let me know when you need me.'"





















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STAR TREK NEMESIS







After a long break, box-office royalty Leonardo DiCaprio is back with two big movies this holiday season. Ron Dicker followed Hollywood's golden boy to Cannes to see if the first one to hit theatres, Gangs of New York, is likely to spur a second wave of Leo-mania


hen the higher-ups at Miramax decided to shoot Gangs of New York not in the Big Apple, but at Rome's Cinecitta studios, in order to re-create 19th-century Manhattan for a lot less, they had no idea star Leonardo DiCaprio might make them pay in another way. The aging teen idol reportedly couldn't say no to the historic city's tempting club scene, and interrupted the production with his late-night carousing.

There were rumours of a 10-minute rant director Martin Scorsese let loose on DiCaprio after the actor allegedly showed up late one morning. Story was, he'd been out late the night before partying with girlfriend Gisele Bundchen.

But if DiCaprio was living la dolce vita in Rome, the man who signed his paycheque isn't saying. "I'll tell you what he was doing at night," growls Miramax honcho Harvey Weinstein. "He was working on the g--damned script with Kenny Lonergan and working on his character. This whole story is totally exaggerated." Weinstein, DiCaprio, costar Cameron Diaz and Scorsese were speaking with journalists at the Cannes Film Festival, where they came to release a 20-minute snippet of the much-anticipated movie.

DiCaprio, looking grown-up in a dark suit and tie, insists he was strictly professional. "For some reason I have the image of a man about town," he says. "But I can assure you that I never was at parties instead of appearing on the set."

The actor has a bigger obstacle than a playboy persona to overcome. The

>> 28-year-old whose character in Titanic proclaimed he is king of the world, will soon find out whether he's still a king among leading men, thanks in part to Gangs of New York, a saga of immigrant warfare which opens this month.

His reception at Cannes made it clear that, despite being absent from the big screen for more than two years, DiCaprio's celebrity is still unquestioned. Fans went berserk for him on the Croisette (the Riviera community's beachside thoroughfare); the social elite and industry types watched his every move at a cliff-side soirée that lasted until daybreak; the paparazzi were aggressive even by paparazzi standards as DiCaprio walked the red carpet into the Palais des Festivals; and the thousands lucky enough to snag tickets applauded wildly when he entered the Palais's Lumiere theatre.

But DiCaprio's potency at the box office has not matched his popularity of late. After starring in 1997's Titanic the highest-grossing movie of all-time at more than \$600-million (U.S.) -DiCaprio appeared in two duds: Man in the Iron Mask (1998) made just \$56.9million and The Beach (2000) fared even worse at \$39.8-million.

"I try not to be influenced by this," says DiCaprio. "It may sound a bit naive but I just try to find the roles which challenge me."

Much of the news DiCaprio has made since his last film has revolved around his on/off relationship with Brazilian model Bundchen and his single-guy forays into Hollywood's nightlife with the likes of Spider-Man's Tobey Maguire.

Now DiCaprio will try to romance the public with a film shepherded by one of Hollywood's most revered directors. "It's like a dream come true for me, as it would be for any actor, to work in a Martin Scorsese epic," DiCaprio says. "I've learned more during this shoot than I've ever learned in all the roles that I've done before."

Filmgoers will decide whether the dream has a fairy tale ending. But if the reaction at Cannes was any indication, DiCaprio might finally be able to leave that sinking ship behind. The audience cheered with abandon after the 20-minute clip, as DiCaprio stood up and played maestro, guiding the adulation toward Scorsese.

The first thing one noticed in that

taste of Gangs was DiCaprio's additional heft. "I worked out like crazy in a fitness centre," he explains. "I've gained about 25 pounds in muscle." The bulk gave his character more presence - a necessity given that he shares the screen with acting heavyweight Daniel Day-Lewis. "It's like a war for him," DiCaprio recalls. "It's like fighting a battle. You feel that intensity in the air, and you feed off of it, and it makes you better as an actor."

In the sepia-toned, blood-stained film, the streets of New York are muddy and lawless, giving DiCaprio a charged environment in which to strut his stuff. It's the mid-1800s and lower Manhattan is a ground zero of a different kind. Riots stemming from the military draft are erupting throughout the Five Points section and DiCaprio's Irish orphan, Amsterdam Vallon, returns after 15 years to join the fray. Characters wear circus-like outfits to show their gang affiliation, much like gang colours of today, but the alliances are tenuous.

Nativists hate the Irish and all immigrants. And Day-Lewis's Bill the Butcher, a Nativist who holds sway over most of the crime mobs, hates pretty much everyone and rules all with an iron fist.

Unbeknownst to the Butcher, Vallon has a personal beef with him. He saw the Butcher stab his father to death during a Nativist-Irish donnybrook years before. So he infiltrates the Butcher's bunch to help the Irish and exact revenge. Diaz plays the Butcher's girlfriend who develops feelings for Vallon.

"I have to admit, I was unfamiliar with the Draft Riots, their historical significance and what it meant to our country," says DiCaprio. "It's a really unique time in our history. It was the birth of our country basically. The more I learned about it, the more fascinating it was and the more applicable it was to our time even now."

And the widely reported tension between Weinstein and Scorsese, who

▶ argued over the film's length and content, now seems to be history as well. They presented a united front at Cannes, even if the final cut is around 2 hours, 40 minutes, some 20 minutes short of what Scorsese wanted. (The budget soared to \$100-million (U.S.), a first for a Miramax release.)

The movie was originally set to open last December but was delayed after the attacks of September 11 because of the New York connection. It was then set to open Christmas Day of this year, until two months ago when Miramax shuffled the film to December 20 to avoid a box-office war with DiCaprio's other movie coming out that day, Catch Me if You Can.

Perhaps this time DiCaprio will hold on to the A-list status that seemed ordained early on. Meanwhile, his mystique seems to grow. "People come up to me all the time," he says. "It's nonstop and it's out of control. Wherever I go people seem to want a part of me."

At least he has a sense of humour about it all. At a party after the *Gangs* screening in Cannes, DiCaprio watched as a birthday cake was presented to someone, then asked a reporter, "How much would you give me to jump up on that table and say, 'I'm king of the world'?" **6**

#### MOVIE MUSIC

Sandra Bullock, star and co-producer of this month's romantic comedy *Two Weeks Notice*, is so fond of the Counting Crows' version of the Joni Mitchell classic "Big Yellow Taxi" — originally released as a hidden track on the band's latest CD *Hard Candy* — she used it in the movie's title sequence.

"I usually have a rule of not putting anything in a movie unless I've seen it," Crows singer Adam Duritz told Famous.
"But I met with Sandra and the director and they showed me a whole bunch of scenes. It's really funny and the chemistry between [Bullock and co-star Hugh Grant] is really great."

The song isn't the first from the Crows to make it to the silver screen. to," he says. "I don't really
see the appeal. I think
some people want to be

more famous. For some people this is about being a star and acting is a part of that. For me, I'm happy with what I do and I don't really need to branch out...and I sure don't need to be more famous than I am."




#### Sega Bass Fishing Duel >>> PS2
