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

few years ago, when director Sam Mendes was casting his big-screen debut American Beauty, he had his eye on an actor named Tom Hanks. Unfortunately, so did everyone else, and Hanks couldn't fit it into his schedule. Kevin Spacey went on to turn in, perhaps, the best performance of his celebrated career, nabbing an Oscar in the process. And Hanks' brush with the project became nothing more than the answer to a trivia question.

But, clearly, the pair's interest

in working together never dissipated, and when Mendes started work on his second feature, Road to Perdition, Hanks cleared his schedule to take on the role of a gangland hitman on the run. Hanks as a hitman? Yes, it does seem to be a departure for the amiable everyman. But in "On the Road," page 26, the actor tells you why he doesn't necessarily see it that way.

This month, Harrison Ford turns 60. That's right, 60.

And he'll mark the occasion by starring in the reality-based submarine epic K-19: The Widowmaker - his first movie since 2000's What Lies Beneath, and first action-thriller since 1997's Air Force One.

On the eve of Ford's entry to the ranks of senior citizens, we take a look at how Hollywood's richest man got started, why we know so little about his personal life, and the effect his arrival had on a couple of smaller Canadian communities where he shot parts of the film. 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

Pot head

Clint Eastwood has politics. Ethan Hawke writes books. De Niro runs a restaurant. And if he ever gets tired of the hurly-burly of Hollywood, Lance Henriksen has a second career lined up making pottery.

It turns out the noted actor — best known as lawman Frank Black on the Fox series *Millennium* and the android Bishop in *Aliens* has been throwing down clay and spinning brightly patterned bowls, cups and plates for more than 35 years.

"I come from an artistic family," he explains, on the phone from California. "I could paint at a



very early age. And I used to travel, back in the early days, by painting murals — I went to Italy and Cyprus by painting murals for food."

But painting, he says, left him flat, so he turned from canvas to the kiln. "I wanted to learn to use glazes and paint with them like I do

oils," he says, adding with a laugh, "and I'm still struggling and intoxicated with the material."

He turns out roughly 5,000 pieces a year all by hand, all by him personally — at his 20acre spread near L.A. "When I was doing *Millennium* up in Vancouver I didn't do any pottery," he recalls. "On my one day off I'd drift into someone's pottery shop and almost fall asleep. But I just wanted to be there."

"Now I'm back to making movies, so four months out of the year I'm slaving at pottery and loving it." Working with his hands, he says, is a welcome break from the mayhem of Hollywood.

Henriksen's current work is up for grabs at www.bylancehenriksen.com. "I want to take the preciousness out of pottery," he says. "I'd rather wake people up than put them to sleep." —*SD*

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



Who's In It? Christian Bale, Matthew **McConaughey** Who Directed? Rob Bowman (The X-Files) What's It About? It's 20 years in the future

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GEENA DAVIS

Now appearing in...Stuart Little 2 as the adoptive mother of an adventurous mouse.

Bio bits: On her eclectic resumé - somewhere between her archery skills and the 140-or-so IQ — it should be noted that Geena Davis works well with unusual co-stars like ghosts, bright furry aliens and mansized insects. Movies such as Beetlejuice, Earth Girls are Easy and The Fly made this former model a star. So it makes sense that, after a string of human-centric bombs (Angie, Cutthroat Island), she climbed back atop the box office with help from computergenerated rodent Stuart Little.

But the modeling got her started. After leaving Boston University with a drama degree, the six-foot Wareham, Mass. native (born in 1956), moved to New York and found work at Ann Taylor as a sales clerk and later as a human mannequin in the window displays. At 23 she started working the catwalks of Paris and the pages of Victoria's Secret. It was producer Sydney Pollack who spotted the coltish beauty in the catalogue and gave her a part in Tootsie.

Encouraged by the film's success, Davis moved to L.A. and found work on TV, alongside Dabney Coleman on Buffalo Bill, as a maid on Family Ties, and then, in 1985, on her own short-lived sitcom Sara.

Her next project, Transylvania 6-5000, tanked, but introduced Davis to her future husband Jeff Goldblum. The pair fared better with both The Fly and the sci-fi musical Earth Girls, but they divorced in 1990, a year after Davis won the Best Supporting Actress Oscar for The Accidental Tourist, and the year before she shared a Best Actress nomination with Susan Sarandon for Thelma & Louise.

LARA FLYNN BOYLE

Now appearing in...the sci-fi comedy Men in Black 2, with Will Smith and Tommy Lee Jones, as an evil alien posing as a shapely lingerie model.

Bio bits: It's a good thing that, as a teenager, Lara Flynn Boyle was such a lousy reader. Because it was only after she'd flunked many classes that the very shy, very thin young girl was diagnosed with a nasty case of dyslexia. Her treatment? Fifty CCs of improv, dance and acting classes at the prestigious Piven Theater.

By that time, Boyle — who was born March 24, 1970 in Davenport,

lowa — and her mother had been on their own for almost 10 years, Sally Boyle's brief marriage having been annulled when Lara was five. Mother and daughter were close and, as Lara took to the stage, both became obsessed with acting. Sally Boyle would wake her daughter in the middle of the night if there was a good movie on TV and, thus, Lara has seen The Way We Were no less than 33 times.

Emboldened by her time at Piven, Lara's grades improved and she soon won a scholarship to the equally elite Chicago Academy for the Arts, a private high school for the performing arts.

Her big break came in 1985, at 15, when she landed a part in the controversial ABC miniseries Amerika, playing a teen in a Sovietoccupied United States. The day after graduation, the Boyles moved to L.A. and, with her mother acting as her manager, Lara was immediately hired for David Lynch's landmark series Twin Peaks. Boyle put in two seasons on the oddball mystery-soap, and parlayed the show's success into multiple movie roles — including a memorable turn as Mike Myers' deranged ex-girlfriend ("It's a gun rack!") in Wayne's World.

Her mom is still her manager and best friend, and both share a house in the San Fernando Valley with four dogs and 11 TVs.



It's been a long time since he outran the Empire at light speed or galloped through the Egyptian desert on horseback. But, at 60, Harrison Ford is still winning sexiest man alive contests and taking home \$25-million paycheques. We take a look back at the career of the Hollywood icon, and forward to his new role as a Russian submarine captain in *K-19: The Widowmaker* By Marri Woicz

n Gimli, school kids skipped class with their parents' permission — to get a snapshot of the Hollywood star who was filming in their Manitoba town.

In Halifax, more than 1,000 shipyard workers, students and regular folk responded to a call for extras, even though only a fraction of them had the slightest chance of appearing on screen. A big American movie shooting north of the border is certainly no rarity these days, so shouldn't these people be blasé about it? Well, if the film stars Benjamin Bratt, sure. Even David Duchovny. But this was the Russian sub epic *K-19: The Widowmaker*.

And when it opens across the continent this month, the name atop the marquee will be Harrison Ford. The same Harrison Ford who piloted the Millennium Falcon that rescued Princess Leia from the evil empire in *Star Wars*. The Harrison Ford who single-handedly wrested the holy Ark of the Covenant from the clutches of the Nazi regime in *Raiders of the Lost Ark*. The Harrison Ford who is considered the elder statesman of Hollywood's leading men. The Harrison Ford who, in 1998 (at age 56) was chosen as *People's* Sexiest Man Alive. And the Harrison Ford who the 2001 *Guinness Book of Records* named the world's richest male actor.

"I'm so star-stricken," Debbie Johnson, front desk clerk at the Gimli hotel where Ford stayed, told *The Winnipeg Sun.* "Usually I'd go up to him, but he's just so damn handsome I don't know what to say." Odds are, neither would Ford.

The 60-year-old actor has never liked attention, often coming off as bashful and uncomfortable in TV interviews. Sure, he does his fair share of press when it comes to promoting his films, but he draws a solid line between his personal and professional lives, and rarely talks about his marriages or kids. As he told USA Weekend in 1998, fame


is "like having a limp. You live with it." But when you've been in the business as long as he has (his first credited film role was as a lieutenant in 1967's *A Time for Killing*) there's a fair bit that seeps out.

Born in 1942 Chicago to an Irish father who worked as an ad exec, and a Jewish homemaker mother, young Harrison didn't exactly excel as a child. Never better than a C student, he was also no standout as an athlete. He did, however, become involved with his high school's startup radio station, and when WMTH FM hit the airwaves in 1960, Ford was its first voice on air. Summerstock theatre and student productions at Wisconsin's Ripon College followed, and Ford realized acting was a better way to spend his life than behind a desk.

In the mid-'60s Ford was doing a play in Laguna Beach when he was invited to meet with a Columbia Pictures casting director. The interview went okay. Ford answered questions about his height, weight, whether he could ride a horse. Then he was thanked for his time.

But on the way to the elevator he took a detour to the washroom. When he emerged, the casting director's assistant was running down the hall, shouting for him to come back and sign a contract. "I have no idea why the guy sent that guy **>>**





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▶ after me," Ford told an Associated Press writer in 2000, "but I do know if I had gone down that elevator, I wouldn't have been worth chasing to the street."

> That contract lead to uncredited bit parts in films like the 1966 James Coburn crime pic *Dead Heat on a Merry-Go-Round* and 1967's Jack Lemmon comedy *Luv*.

> The story of his next big break — the role in *Star Wars* — is now legend. Ford was making ends meet between acting gigs as a carpenter, and just happened to be working on a new door for Francis Ford Coppola's office when George Lucas was holding *Star Wars* auditions down the hall.

> Lucas was, at first, reluctant to cast Ford as Han Solo, since they'd worked together on Lucas's 1973 classic American Graffiti,

Ford and Mathison married in 1983 and, after adding two more kids, Malcolm and Georgia, to the mix, seemed to be one of the few successful couples in Hollywood. "When I married Melissa," Ford told *Redbook* in 1989, "I found it was such a pleasure not to be angry and not to have that bitterness running around in my system."

For almost two decades, the family split their time between homes in Los Angeles, New York, and a ranch in Jackson Hole, Wyoming that Ford helped build. But in August 2001 their seemingly stable marriage came to an end, and for the first time in his career Ford's social life became fodder for gossip columnists. Of course, he didn't help himself by developing a taste for starlets half his age — first dating



during which Ford developed a reputation for being sullen and difficult. But, truth was, those were exactly the qualities Han Solo needed, so Lucas relented. Han Solo would become the germ of many of Ford's future heroes — brave, swaggering, but reluctant in a way that made him more interesting than your typical do-gooder. It was the type of heroism that he would repeat in the Indiana Jones films, in 1982's cult favourite *Blade Runner* and 1985's *Witness* — the only role for which he earned an Oscar nomination.

By the time Ford made *Star Wars*, he was married to his college sweetheart Mary Marquardt and had two young sons — Willard (now a karate instructor) and Ben (now a chef). But by 1979 their marriage was over. Ford has said they wed too young (he was 22) and admitted he hadn't been the best husband or father.

It was while working on Coppola's Vietnam masterpiece *Apocalypse Now* — he had a small part as "Colonel Lucas" — that Ford met the woman who would become his second wife, screenwriter Melissa Mathison, there as an executive assistant.

Minnie Driver, then hanging around with Lara Flynn Boyle, and most recently becoming involved with Calista Flockhart.

There's no doubt Ford would prefer the spotlight be redirected back at his films, and there's a good chance that will happen with *K-19*. Although his last movie, 2000's ghost thriller *What Lies Beneath* did well at the box office, it got mixed reviews and Ford's villainous lead role neglected his biggest strength — playing the hero. His two previous films, the romantic drama *Random Hearts* and quirky plane-crash comedy *Six Days Seven Nights* did nothing to impress the critics, and left crowds yearning for their old take-charge good guy.

With *K-19*, Ford once again becomes the saviour, this time as the real-life captain of Russia's first nuclear ballistic submarine. In 1961, on its maiden voyage, the sub had a malfunction in its nuclear reactor, and had the crew not prevented a meltdown, the disaster could have been interpreted by Western forces as a deliberate nuclear strike spurring a Third World War.

The film — which aside from filming in Nova Scotia and Manitoba, picked up shots

in Toronto, Iceland and Russia — has an estimated budget between \$60-million and \$100-million (U.S.), with \$25-million of that going straight into Ford's pocket.

But money isn't everything and the larger question is, will K-19 put Ford back on top with critics and fans? Hard to know for sure. But theatres in Gimli and Halifax should be packed.



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He's come a long way in 20 years, starring as assorted heroes, simpletons and romantic leads. But in the gangster pic *Road to Perdition*, **Tom Hanks** plays against type as a cold-hearted contract killer. Has Hollywood's number one good guy had enough of playing nice? | BY EARL DITTMAN

e've all become accustomed to seeing Tom Hanks as the good guy, the funny fella, the romantic leading man and the fearless hero. With performances in such films as *Forrest Gump*, *Cast Away*, *Big*, *Apollo 13*, *Philadelphia* and *You've Got Mail*, the 46-year-old actor/director has secured a nice little warm spot in the hearts of moviegoers the world over. And while he has played a few emotionally flawed characters over the years, audiences have never seen him in a role like the morally compromised professional killer he plays in *Road to Perdition*, the new film from *American Beauty* director Sam Mendes. It's a performance that transforms Hollywood's all-around Mr. Nice Guy into Public Enemy Number One.

Hanks plays Michael Sullivan, a hitman for a ruthless Irish gang in the Depressionera Midwest. With a merciless indifference toward his victims, Sullivan is a consummate professional. But when his work crosses into his private life, leading to the death of his wife and child, he and his surviving son set out on a quest for revenge that unexpectedly turns into a journey filled with hope and redemption. Dark and brooding, *Road to Perdition* features an all-star cast that also includes Paul Newman, Jude Law, Jennifer Jason Leigh and Stanley Tucci.

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"TWO THUMBS UP

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▶ "I got to work with a great director and alongside a fantastic group of actors in an unbelievably powerful script — this film is an actor's dream," says Hanks, standing in the ballroom of a posh Dallas hotel, eyeing a massive buffet table. He gravitates toward the desserts, coming away with a couple of pieces of chocolate cake. "It's a film that gave me a chance to go places I haven't been to in a while. I just hope audiences respond to it the way that I did, because it's a film that you will have a hard time getting out of your head. You won't forget it. And isn't that what great filmmaking is supposed to be about?"

$\left[q\right]$ What made you choose this role over all the others you must be offered?

[a] "It's a lot different than the things I've been doing lately. *Road to Perdition* is still a big-budget, mainstream motion picture, but the nature of the subject matter and the fact that Sam Mendes is the guy that's making it, I think really separates it from the norm. It's going to be an uncompromising movie, and it also takes a lot of chances."

[Q] What were some of the challenges with this script?

[a] "It's a movie about bootleggers and crime, so you can fall into the realm of following the numbers because it is a genre film.... There still has to be this original story that speaks exactly to the concepts that are affecting us today. Otherwise, you are making a museum piece. And that's no good. You can look at the Merchant Ivory films, because they speak very much about what's going on today. There is something timeless about them. But then you have some people doing costume dramas and it's really just about the pretty costumes. Who cares about that? So that's where you get into this quagmire, because it is fraught with pitfalls and dangers from a storytelling point of view that you always have to constantly test. Otherwise, go to a dinner theatre and do Guys and Dolls if you just want to wear fedoras."

[Q] You've said that you feel like you're always defending the fact that you are a nice guy. Are you trying to prove you can play a bad man?

[**a**] "No, because I think I've always played very flawed, dark guys. I think I did in *Punchline*. In *Saving Private Ryan*, here was



"I think I've always played very flawed, dark guys.... In *Saving Private Ryan*, here was a guy who butchered people with his bare hands," says Hanks a guy who butchered people and killed 15year-olds with his bare hands. And I play an executioner in *The Green Mile*, even though he's the nicest one you'll probably ever meet. I'm only interested in characters whose motivations I understand and that the dramatic elements are so confining that they need to be explored through the course of a movie."

[Q] Would you ever consider taking a small role in an independent film?

[a] "Oh yeah.... But there has to be this organic reality to it, otherwise it's just stunt casting, and that doesn't work. The audience can see it a million miles away. That would be equal to me doing dinner theatre. It can't be a hobby. It can't be something like, 'I'm doing something different, I'm playing with my image.' No, it absolutely has to be this organic truth that when they can see absolutely nobody else doing it but me. And when I read it, I have to agree with it and I say, 'You guys have got to have me. I can't believe you guys are offering me the chance to do this movie."

[Q] It's amazing to look at you in *Road to Perdition* and realize it's the same guy that did *Bosom Buddies* on TV 22 years ago.

[**a**] "It's been 22 years now? Has it really? Nah. Yeah, I guess it is, because we went on in 1980. Obviously, a lot has changed for me since then [laughs]."

[Q] Was there a project in your career where your perception of who you were as an actor changed?

[a] "Well, yeah, because there was a time when I just did anything that came along. Because I couldn't believe they were still asking me to make movies. I was like, 'You're kidding? They still want me? Great! What's it about?"

[Q] Like The Money Pit?

[a] "Yeah, there's an example of what I was talking about. I just took it because they wanted me. But I always knew that I wanted to blow out the horizons a little bit. There was a year where I made two very distinctive movies. I made Punchline and Big almost back to back. And at the end of Big, I realized I couldn't do movies back to back anymore. I said, 'I just don't have an original thought left in my head.' Also, Punchline was the first time I put myself out on the line with the research and preparatory side of it. I think it completely altered me. But then I had to forget that and just adopt the kid character in Big, and keep it up during the course of the movie. That was a frightening thing for me, because I actually thought, 'Oh my God, I actually have technique at my disposal, which I never had before.' So, that was the year it sort of all came together for me.

Even with that, though, the next movies I made — The 'Burbs, Turner & Hooch, Joe Versus the Volcano and Bonfire of the Vanities — I was still trying to tinker with this thing that was going on inside me and trying to adhere to it in movies that rightly didn't quite work as well. Because you know what? It is really hard to make a good movie."

[Q] How did the Oscar wins for *Philadelphia* and *Forrest Gump* figure into finding yourself as an actor?

[**a**] "Winning an Academy Award is a really great personal moment, but it has a finite shelf life. It lasts for a while, then it honestly goes away. People think I won last year. It's like winning the Super Bowl — it's a real nice thing to have gone through it, but the best thing that you can do is say, 'I won the Super Bowl that year. And that was a long time ago.' After that, it has no correlation to what you're working on."

$\left[\boldsymbol{Q}\right]$ Do you think you have a shot at another one for Road to Perdition?

[a] "I don't know. It's not up to us. These days, you can read a story in February that reads, 'The Oscar Race, So Far!' In January and February, they are already predicting the rest of the year. That's crazy. It's all like this big massive horse race that you can't pay attention to. But you can't avoid paying attention to it. It's just gotten too big. Even the AFI is coming out with its own Top Ten - it's too much. It's become like this flu season. 'Am I going to get the flu? Do I want to get the flu? Am I going to lose the weight that comes along with getting the flu? Yeah, I'd like the rest of getting the flu. I could enjoy a couple of days of just laying around and being taken care of.' But there's nothing you can do to avoid it, so you just try and let it wash over you."

[Q] So, you could go through the rest of your career without winning another award and be okay with it?

[**a**] "Easily. Look, I'm basically an actor who is just trying to do good work and make decent films. I like being recognized for it, but it's not what I think about every night before I go to bed. There's too many other important things to worry about. I have a real life that I enjoy living. Making movies is just my job. Don't get me wrong, I like it, a lot. I mean, I get big paycheques for doing something I'd do for free. But, at the end of the day, when I leave a movie set, I go home and I'm Tom Hanks, the husband, the dad and the guy who takes out the trash. Nothing is more rewarding than that." **G**




BOB'S HER UNCLE

CHURCH SONGS

ON LEAVE FROM THE PHILOSOPHER KINGS, JARVIS CHURCH MIXES POP. R&B AND REGGAE ON HIS SUBLIME SHAKE IT OFF BY MICHAEL WHITE



he CD in your hands might read "Jarvis Church," but the soulful voice flowing from the CD player sounds uncannily like Philosopher Kings frontman Gerald Eaton. And indeed, the two men are one and the same. The Toronto-based pop/R&B group to which Church - née Eaton - belonged may never have officially broken up, but their hiatus has lasted almost as long as their recording career. Following a five-year stretch that produced a platinum album (1997's Young, Rich and Beautiful), and pop radio staples such as "Charms," the Kings splintered into two new projects. Bassist Jay Levine and guitarist James McCollum created the successful cartoon pop duo Prozaak; while Church and guitarist Brian West formed a production team which discovered Nelly Furtado and produced her worldwide smash debut, Whoa, Nelly!

Taking his new name from the downtown neighbourhood bordered by Jarvis and Church Streets in Toronto, Church's debut solo album, Shake it Off, arguably bests anything that the Kings made in their not undistinguished career. Church credits the album's infectious air of joie de vivre to the thrill of answering to no one but his own artistic muse.

"A great thing about the Philosopher Kings is the fact that it truly was a democracy, so it was almost like we were all striving to create some-

thing that was different from all of us, that no one really owned or controlled - it was just like an entity unto itself," says Church. "Having experienced that, at this stage of my life it was incredibly gratifying to have something that was completely mine.

"My whole mission in making this album was to try to express myself, so it was a real sort of inward search of who I am and 'What are all the elements that make me who I am?' - and trying to somehow express that in a way that's understandable to people. I barely understand who I am," he chuckles.

If Shake it Off's 13 tracks reveal anything about Church, it's his diverse musical interests. The album's adventuresome mix of influences - pop, R&B, reggae, Latin, to name a few was also a result of his experience producing Furtado's eclectic multiplatinum blockbuster.

"I think that the biggest thing I learned from having made Nelly's record was to just trust that if I made something that I liked, other people would like it as well," he says. "That was sort of the mantra between Brian, myself and Nelly let's make an album that just we love."

Church's mantra will almost certainly be proven well-founded. Shake it Off wields undeniable commercial promise (U.S. pop culture magazine Blender declared it a potential monster almost two months before its release). Whether the title track's old-school '70s soul vibe, or the melding of contemporary dance beats and Brazilian bossa nova guitar on "She's in Love with You," this is pop music that aims for the charts but doesn't bypass the brain.

"The big pop boom that we're sort of coming out of right now has really shaped music over the past five years," says Church. "There hasn't been that much emphasis on artistry, and what I mean by that is an artist trying to express who they are and saying something about themselves, or something unique. I just feel like people are capable of getting so much more than they're given."

In Shake it Off, Church has given the masses a fortune. They're sure to repay him in kind.

DIAL F FOR FRAUD WHO PAYS THE BILL WHEN A HIJACKED COMPUTER CALLS AFRICA? | BY SEAN DAVIDSON

dds are, you don't know anyone in Chad. Or Madagascar. Or Sao Tome. And, let's assume for the sake of argument, you are not in the habit of making longdistance calls to the far side of the Atlantic in order to gamble or download porn.

But that doesn't mean you won't get stuck with the bill, as victims of a recent internet scam learned when their modems — hijacked by a new breed of malicious software — dialed some very expensive numbers in various faraway lands. the so-called "spyware," and were having little luck pleading their cases to Bell Canada. Other incidents throughout the 705 and 519 area codes had also been reported by local media.

Bell agreed to investigate Stephenson's bill. "I told them I'd pay what I owe, the rest I'm not going to pay," he says. "It's fraud."

Except that it's not, at least not according to Bell Canada. The phone company says it doesn't matter who or what dialed the phone, or why — if the call was made as described on the bill, the customer

is responsible for the charges. "The bottom line is people should be more aware of their actions online," says spokesperson Andrew Cole, "in particular reading online warnings and disclosure boxes before downloading anything."

Spyware often comes bundled with other, frequently shady software and secretly writes itself to the hard drive during the install process. Notice can sometimes be found buried in the lengthy end-user agreements. But security weaknesses in certain software - most notably the notoriously flimsy Microsoft Internet Explorer -

make it possible for malicious code to sneak onto a computer without so much as a single "OK" click. Virus scanners are little or no help.

The exact behaviour, and origin, of the Sao Tome dialer remains unclear, but Cole says only "a very small percentage" of customers have been hit.

PhoneBusters, a joint anti-fraud unit of the RCMP and the Ontario Provincial Police, has 102 cases on the books, to the tune of \$62,000. But Detective Staff Sergeant Barry Elliott thinks the actual numbers are much higher, in part because

phone companies, he suspects, are playing dumb.

"I think Bell's hiding the true numbers," he says. "They're trying to stick it to the customer.... There's very little co-operation by telephone companies in this country to fight fraud."

Cole says Bell isn't hiding anything, but repeats that the Sao Tome scam doesn't fit the company's definition of fraud.

Until it gets sorted out, David Stephenson is still on the hook for more than \$300. He says he had to wipe his entire hard drive to get rid of the dialer, and is thinking about installing a firewall for added security.

"And from now on, I leave the phone unplugged from the computer," he says. "Even when it's turned off."

David Stephenson of Midland, Ontario, was surprised to find almost a dozen calls to the African island nation of Sao Tome on his April phone bill, bringing it to a grand total of \$371. He insists no one in his family made the calls, and blames viruslike code that infected his PC.

"It's piggy-backed down into my computer. It's set up its own files. It's set up its own dialer," says Stephenson, a police officer. "Someone put a program into my computer without my consent or knowledge."

He soon learned that two co-workers and a neighbour had also been stung by AL KAL



Geddy Lee MAKES HIS PICKS

R ight now, Canadian rockers Rush are on the road for the umpteenth time since forming in the late '60s. But, unless you live in Toronto, you might not see them this summer. As of press time, a July 17 stop at T.O.'s Molson Amphitheatre was their only Canadian date. We're sure, however, that won't keep the tunes from their 23rd album, *Vapor Trails*, from seeping out of radios on decks, patios and cottage beaches all summer long.

Geddy Lee, the band's 48-year-old singer/bassist, and a self-proclaimed movie buff, was in Rush's Toronto management office doing interviews for the new album when he set aside some time to talk film with *Famous*.

WHAT ARE YOUR FIVE FAVOURITE FILMS?

"Number one is Annie Hall [1977], a film that I've maybe seen a hundred times. When you travel by bus and you're on the road you have an opportunity to watch films quite often. I've always been a big Woody Allen fan and to me that's his best work. It's a great combination of comedy and his view of life in a very funny and thought-provoking way. • Number two is **Citizen Kane** [1941] because Orson Welles is a huge favourite of mine. It's kind of a sad story in terms of his talent — he was so young when he rubbed the Hearst family the wrong way with that film and they used all their power to destroy his career. • Number three is Unforgiven [1992], one of the great American films. It's brilliantly dark and classic at the same time, and the lead character is such a fallible antihero that I think it's just a fascinating character study. • Number four is Mr. Deeds Goes to Town [1936]. So many of [Frank Capra's] films were gloriously altruistic movies about everyday guys against the big corporate machine. That's a concept that never gets tired and I think it still holds true today. • And number five is Never Give a Sucker an Even Break [1941] by W.C. Fields. It's a story about an actor like W.C. Fields whose career is not going so well. He's selling a new idea for a film to the head of a studio who is reading it, and as he reads it out loud it comes to life. It gets very abstract and very hilarious."

WHO WOULD YOU WANT TO PLAY YOU IN THE MOVIE OF YOUR LIFE?

"Oh, that's a terrible question to ask someone. Ummm...Sean Penn. We have similarly funny-looking faces and he's a great actor."

IF YOU COULD STAR IN ANY FILM, WHAT WOULD IT BE?

"A Night at the Opera, and I would want to be Harpo. I wouldn't have to talk and I could just run around chasing everybody."

WHY IS THERE ONLY ONE CANADIAN DATE ON YOUR SUMMER TOUR?

"So far. I think that'll change.... There will definitely be more than a handful of Canadian dates in the fall."

ARE YOU MORE POPULAR IN THE STATES?

"I would say per capita we're probably more popular in America. I would say we probably could sell out some venue in Iowa easier than we can maybe in Winnipeg."

HOW IS TOURING DIFFERENT AT 48 THAN 21?

"I suspect that it'll be much tougher on my body. I've been working very hard over the last couple of months to get in shape. I am a very active person anyway, I do a lot of sports, I do a lot of working out, a lot of cycling. I think it's also tougher for me to be away from my family. I'm going to miss my life and my regular match at the tennis club. But it's just a few months. I'll just close my eyes and go into some sort of state of denial and try to put on a good show."

DO YOU HAVE A REGIMEN FOR TAKING CARE OF YOUR VOICE?

"When I'm on tour, for sure. I really shouldn't talk on days off and I have to avoid all smoky areas, and I have to change my diet to avoid dairy products, white wine, spicy food, anything mucolitic. And I drink a lot of water."

ARE YOUR VOCAL CORDS IN BETTER OR WORSE SHAPE BECAUSE OF THE WAY YOU SING?

"It depends. It's a muscle. If you use the muscle and don't abuse the muscle it gets stronger. But certainly during the course of a tour it's in a very weakened state and there are times that it gets very susceptible to inflammation like any overused muscle. The night after a show I can't even talk. My voice will not make a sound."

IF YOU HAD TO GIVE UP ONE OF THE FOLLOWING FOR A YEAR WHAT WOULD IT BE — MONEY, SEX OR MUSIC?

"Music. [Laughs.] Because I've been doing it so long I could take a year from it without missing it too much." —Marni Weisz







The most important thing is that my kids need to know they're stable, that there's home, that there's dinner on the table, that there's dinner conversation. And that their mother puts them to bed at night."

SUSAN SARANDON


"I've always told my children that if they can articulate why I should get married, I'd do it."
