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



## Wolf pack-age

Alternate endings, deleted scenes, director commentaries and original storyboards are pretty much standard on DVDs these days — for American films anyway.

Yet check out the discs for your favourite Canadian movies and you'll find little in the way of bonus material. Even big titles like David Cronenberg's *eXistenZ*, Atom Egoyan's *Felicia's Journey* and Denis Villeneuve's Genie-winning *Maelström* feature little more than pumped up picture and sound and, if you're lucky, the odd set of production notes or a "making-of featurette."

But on October 23, the gory werewolf horror *Ginger Snaps* becomes our country's first major DVD to cram almost all of its leftover megabytes with goodies. "I think one of the reasons is that we were working so closely with the director and all the other people who were involved from day one, so we had access to a lot of cool things, like the deleted scenes, cast auditions, rehearsal tapes," says Howard Rabkin, who oversaw the DVD's creation for the film's production company TVA International.

The \$4-million movie shows what happens when 15-year-old Ginger (Katharine Isabelle) is chomped by a werewolf on the eve of her first period and transforms into a blood-thirsty killer canine.

Aside from those deleted scenes, auditions and rehearsal tapes, the DVD also boasts audio commentaries by director John Fawcett and writer Karen Walton, theatrical trailers, a piece about the design and creation of the werewolf, original storyboards and a photo gallery featuring the fake suicide shots Ginger and her sister Brigitte (Emily Perkins) took for a school project.

"The genre of the film lends itself to this sort of release because it's youth oriented and they're certainly more into the cool extras than someone who might just want to watch the film," says Rabkin.

As for why *Ginger Snaps* is the first Canadian DVD to go all out, it could just be the timing. Even though those other titles were released in the last couple of years, in the world of DVD a few months can make a huge difference.

But Rabkin has another suggestion. "To be honest it is a very expensive job," he says. "I mean, this will probably cost us at least five times more than a normal DVD.... But we just thought with this one, we wanted to do it." —*MW*





# Potter

hile Harry Potter fans try not to pop a gasket waiting for next month's release of *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone*, there are some pretty basic questions whizzing around in their little muggle heads.

Did director Chris Columbus (*Bicentennial Man*) stick close to author J.K. Rowling's vision of a young wizard who leaves his unhappy home to attend Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry, or did he put his own spin on things? Does the casting work? What about the sets?

**Bio bits:** This gamine thespian of Spanish and Native American descent was born on July 30, 1974, but there's some dispute as to where. At some point in the audition process for Boys Don't Cry — the true tale of gender-identity-crisis poster boy/girl Brandon Teena that earned Swank an Oscar — the actress told director Kimberly Pierce that she was born in Brandon's hometown of Lincoln, Nebraska. Swank also claimed this lineage in the April 2000 issue of Interview: "You want to hear something really amazing? I was born in the same hospital that Brandon was born in, in Lincoln, Nebraska."

But according to the Internet Movie Database (www.imdb.com), Swank was born in Bellingham, Washington and made the whole story up to help get her the part. According to this version, when Pierce confronted her about the lie, the actress smiled and said of her fibbing character, "But that's what Brandon would do."

Swank has at least one thing in common

with her Boys Don't Cry character. Both grew up poor. Raised by her single mother, Swank lived in a trailer park and was often teased by the other kids at school. But she knew early on that she wanted to act and, at nine, some early gender-bending casting gave Hilary her first starring role — as the orphan boy Mowgli in a local production of The Jungle Book.

When she was 16, Hilary and her mom picked up and moved to L.A. because mom needed a major life change and Hilary was determined to make it as an actor. Living in their car for a while, Hilary quickly began to pick up roles on TV shows like Harry and the Hendersons and in movies like Buffy the Vampire Slayer and The Next Karate Kid. But it was as Steve Sanders' single-mom girlfriend on the 1997/1998 season of Beverly Hills 90210 that she first became a recog-

nizable Hollywood entity. To avoid being bundled together with the Jennie Garths and Tori Spellings of Tinseltown, though, Swank left after one season.

**Interesting tidbits:** Was an athletic kid, swimming in the Junior Olympics and ranking fifth among Washington's gymnasts. • Auditioned for the role of Lucy Hatcher on *The Practice*.

**Bio bits:** What's that they say about children of religious families growing up to be the most rebellious? Well, Heather Graham — bestknown as bare-it-all porn star Rollergirl in *Boogie Nights* — was born into an extremely Catholic family on January 29, 1970, in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Her father, an antiterrorism expert with the FBI, and her mother, a schoolteacher, were hoping Heather would become a nun. To no one's surprise, they did not attend the premiere of *Boogie Nights*.

The family, which includes little sister Aimee who's also an actress (*Rave, Brokedown Palace*), moved around a lot but had settled in Southern California when Heather graduated high school. At first, her parents didn't mind her dramatic leanings, encouraging her through early roles like Dorothy in a high school production of *The Wizard of Oz.* But when they realized it was more than a hobby, they were not amused. And when, at 17, Heather played a



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doomed teen addict in Gus Van Sant's Drugstore Cowboy, the tension rose. She moved out at 18. Other roles that couldn't have delighted her parents include scantily clad Felicity Shagwell in Austin Powers: The Spv Who Shagged Me, a member of a love triangle in Two Girls and a Guy and a sleep-with-anyone-to-get-the-part actress in Bowfinger. Mom and Dad also weren't pleased when a 22-yearold Heather started dating her Diggstown co-star, then-45-year-old James Woods. In fact, Heather and her parents haven't talked for four years, even though her folks have publicly pleaded that she return their calls. Heather insists she must separate herself from anyone who disapproves of her choices.

### **STEVE ZAHN**

Now appearing in... Riding in Cars with Boys opposite Drew Barrymore. Zahn plays Barrymore's drug-addicted husband in this true story about a woman who weathers poverty and divorce to become a writer.

**Bio bits:** He's been on the verge of full-on fame for years now, stealing scenes in more than two dozen movies as various dim-witted bit characters, but never quite, until recently, getting any major Hollywood roles.

Steve Zahn — better known as the best friend in Forces of Nature, the possibly deranged clerk in You've Got Mail and the slow-witted crook in Out of Sight — was born on November 13, 1968, in the suburban town of Marshall, Minnesota. His mom worked at the YMCA, his dad was a Lutheran minister, and Steve was a typical mid-West slacker who spent his teen years watching too much TV and driving his Chevette into snow drifts for fun.

But when he wasn't goofing off or "snowbanking," Zahn performed in high school plays. After graduation he enrolled at a nearby liberal arts college but dropped out partway through his first year. He moved back home, got a job in a machine shop, took modern dance lessons and started going to auditions.

He wasn't invited to the try-outs for a local dinner theatre, but showed up anyway and was handed the lead in the Neil Simon play Biloxi Blues. But, like college, Zahn didn't stick around the dinner theatre very long and, in 1989, moved east to study drama at the high falutin' joint program run by the American Repertory Theater and Harvard's Institute for Advanced Theater Training. After graduation, he relocated to New Jersey, holding down parttime jobs in Hoboken while crossing the river into Manhattan for auditions.

The New York theatre circuit introduced him to both his wife, fellow actor Robyn Peterman whom he met while doing a production of Bye Bye, Birdie, and one of his best friends in rising star Ethan Hawke, with whom he appeared in the play Sophistry. It was also where he met Ben Stiller, then directing Hawke in Reality Bites. Stiller was so impressed by Zahn's work in Sophistry that he handed him a small part



*in the movie. That small but memorable role, as a sensitive gay man, got him noticed and landed him a handful of other bit parts in movies like Crimson Tide and Race the Sun.* 

Zahn has finally started to move into starring roles and drew warm reviews for his job as an escaped convict in *Happy, Texas.* He lives on a farm in New Jersey with his wife and son.


haved bald and wearing a nondescript light blue dress, Cate Blanchett is almost unrecognizable as she strolls into her Beverly Hills hotel room. It's difficult to believe this is the same woman who bedazzled moviegoers, critics and Golden Globe voters as the commanding Virgin Queen in the 1998 historical drama *Elizabeth*.

"I look pretty different, don't I?" she asks rhetorically, running her fingers across the light fuzz that has begun to sprout on her scalp. "About two months ago, Giovanni Ribisi and I did a film in Tuscany with Tom Tykwer called *Heaven*, the last screenplay by [late Polish filmmaker] Krzysztof Kieslowski, and we had to shave our heads.... I found doing it completely liberating, like an act of purity, even though people look at me like I'm a skinhead."

Although she's come to fancy her new hairdo (or lack thereof), the fact that she's missing her strawberry blond locks means Blanchett has to wear a wig for the Bruce Willis/Billy Bob Thornton romantic comedy *Bandits*, which she's taking a break from shooting on this day. "I never like wearing wigs, because I find it a bit gross to be using someone else's old hair," she says with disgust. "Even if they are fake wigs, I still feel like I'm using old body parts. But I'm supposed to be the love interest in the film, so I don't think people would buy Bruce and Billy Bob's characters falling for a bald-headed broad."

And having spent the previous night working on *Bandits* into the wee hours, she has to admit being hairless has its advantages. "This would definitely have been a bad hair day for me because I'm so tired," she says with a laugh. "But, since I don't have any, once I came in from the airport, I just showered, threw on some clothes and here I am. I'm very low maintenance at the moment...and a little beat."

Blanchett has a right to be exhausted. Since making her Oscar-nominated splash as the Queen of England, the 32-year-old Aussie has been working almost non-stop, traveling the globe from Italy (*The Talented Mr. Ripley*) to Savannah, Georgia (*The Gift*) to New Zealand (*The Lord of the Rings* trilogy) to Newfoundland (*The Shipping News*). She'll be forced to take a break early next year when she and husband Andrew Upton welcome their first child. Until then, she's not going to complain about the tough schedule.

"There are so many other talented people out there who would kill to be in the position that I'm in," she says, pouring herself a cup of java. "I've been blessed with the ability to work with people that I admire in these incredible projects. So what if I didn't get to sleep last night? At least I can say I was frolicking on the beach with Bruce Willis, Billy Bob Thornton and [director] Barry Levinson. How many people can say that?"

In *Bandits*, Blanchett plays Kate, an ordinary woman married to a disinterested husband and desperate for a little attention from the opposite sex. So, when she crosses paths with two friendly thieves who've just escaped from prison, she develops feelings for both of them. As she becomes a participant in their not-so-deadly, bank-robbing crime spree, she must decide which con — the suave Joe (Willis) or his hypochondriac partner Terry (Thornton) — is the man for her.

"It's this kind of rollicking, romantic comedy," Blanchett says, "and what makes it even more hilarious is the fact that Bruce and Billy Bob's characters are actually based on two real bank robbers. They are criminals, but they are also nice guys. So Kate, whose life isn't functioning very well, forces them to take her hostage, hoping to find true love. It's like this really dysfunctional ménage à trois."

Blanchett, who co-starred with Thornton in 1999's *Pushing Tin*, was invited to join the *Bandits* cast on her final day of shooting *The Gift*, a supernatural thriller which Billy Bob co-wrote.

As for her other co-star, working with Bruce Willis — who sometimes takes home upwards of \$20-million per picture — has given her a sense of what it means to be part of a big-budget Hollywood feature.

"Bruce has definitely got a lot of trailers," she says, laughing, about his mini-mansionon-wheels. "I mean, there are a lot more trailers just for the actors in *Bandits* than there were for the entire production of *The Gift.* But, again, I'm not complaining because my trailer is gigantic, and I've got a DVD player and a cappuccino machine in it, too.

"But Bruce deserves the perks that he gets, because he is more than just 'a star'.... When I first started out, if you would have asked me what actor I would like to fashion my career after, Bruce's name would have been the furthest from my mind. But, after working with him and realizing he's a very talented man who has just learned how to make this business work to his advantage, I would have to say he's now high on my list of someone whose career I admire and wouldn't be ashamed of having."

Surprisingly, though, acting wasn't a profession Blanchett envisioned for herself while growing up in Melbourne. Her interest in the craft didn't begin until she was at university studying international relations.

"I found out I had to sit through four years of economic history — studying the cattle runs between Melbourne and Sydney — and I just couldn't do it," she says, downing her third cup of coffee in 10 minutes. "Someone suggested that I go to drama school, and I thought I would give it a go. Of course, the girl who said it didn't like me very much, and I think she just wanted me to get out of Melbourne."

Blanchett auditioned for Australia's



prestigious National Institute of Dramatic Art, but, well aware of the school's strict admission policy, she prepared herself for a rejection notice. Much to her surprise, she was accepted. "I thought they had made a mistake so I spent my first two semesters waiting for them to come up to me and go, 'Sorry, you're not the Cate Blanchett we wanted," she says.

After graduating in 1992, Blanchett joined the Sydney Theatre Company where she won the Rosemont Best Actress Award for her part (opposite *Elizabeth* co-star Geoffrey Rush) in David Mamet's *Oleanna*.

Early film roles in *The Wedding Party* and *Oscar and Lucinda* lead to the role that transformed her into an international star. "There's no doubt about it, doing *Elizabeth* changed my life, personally and professionally," she says, pouring herself another cup of coffee — black, with one cube of sugar. "As an actress, it really tested my limits, and I liked that. I mean, I had the responsibility of a whole movie on my shoulders, so it taught me how to be a stronger actress. I certainly needed that when all the award nominations and all the interest in my personal life began. It was a crazy time."


But while she could have cashed in by starring in more costume dramas, Blanchett opted for a more eclectic array of films. "There were a lot of offers to do exactly the same thing again, with or without the corsets, and I wasn't into doing that," she explains. "I found more interest in playing smaller roles in good stories and getting to do different things."

A very different project arrived in 1999 when, at the urging of director Peter Jackson, she accepted the role of elf queen Galadriel in his three-film adaptation of J.R.R. Tolkien's fantasy *The Lord of the Rings*.

The special effects-laden epic, which premieres in December with the first film *Fellowship of the Ring*, allowed Blanchett to discover a facet of moviemaking that was totally foreign to her. "I had never done anything with blue screen before, or prosthetics, or anything like that. *Lord of the Rings* was like stepping into a videogame for me. It was another world completely. But, to be honest, I basically did it so that I could have the ears," she jokes. "I thought they would really work with my bare head."

"Filmmaking, no matter what genre you're working in, you're creating fantasy for an audience," she continues. "And making so-called 'studio films' like *Bandits*, *The Shipping News* and *The Lord of the Rings* have felt like really generous exercises. Since they were such big productions, I felt like I had more time to myself. They haven't spoiled me, though. I still like the thrill and energy that comes with working seven days a week, 15 hours a day on smaller productions. They've just given me a chance to loosen up a little."

Schwarzenegger in *Collateral Damage* 

ON THE SET OF THE NEW ACTION PIC *COLLATERAL DAMAGE*, ARNOLD SCHWARZENEGGER DEFENDS HIMSELF AGAINST SOME BAD PRESS AND USES HIS MOVIE MUSCLE TO SWAY THE DIRECTOR BY JENNY COONEY CARRILLO

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
hy didn't he use a stunt double while he was deciding how much dust was going to be in the shot?" Arnold Schwarzenegger grumbles to a friend as he watches a monitor on the Collateral Damage set, Stage 15 on the Warner Bros. lot in Burbank, California. The man who practically invented the action movie is referring to his latest director, Andrew Davis (The Fugitive), who is trying to guide the Austrian Oak through the world of international terrorism in his latest pic. The production has moved back to a Los Angeles soundstage for a few weeks of complicated stunt shots after an exhausting location shoot in Veracruz, Mexico.

Right now, they're taking a break from shooting a scene that requires Arnie to be hoisted above an elevator ceiling trap door and dropped to the floor. While Davis shouts feedback about the dust level, his leading man, dressed in a dirty gray T-shirt and black pants, strolls over to the monitor to watch the latest take and pass judgement.

Petty spats aside, however, Davis clearly listens to whatever his star has to say and welcomes the intense feedback that occasionally comes with it. "Arnold has not been thought of as an actor but an action icon," Davis explains rapturously, "but I'm knocked out by what he's doing. He loves being directed and his skills are refined because he's worked with some of the best directors in the business."

This time around, Schwarzenegger plays family man and firefighter Gordon Brewer, who's plunged into the complex and dangerous world of international terrorism after he loses his wife and child in a bombing. Frustrated with the official investigation and haunted by the fear that the terrorist responsible for murdering his family (Cliff Curtis) might never be brought to justice, Brewer takes matters into his own hands.

During a quick lunch break, the dirtcovered star enthuses about the role. "There are only a few real basic stories out there, and this is one of them that is always really good because everyone can sympathize and feel like, 'Yeah, I hope he gets those guys,'" he says excitedly. "Then you just follow this guy going through this drama of trying to smuggle himself into Colombia and what he goes through — being thrown into this melting pot of total chaos of the right-wing army of Colombia, the guerillas of Colombia, the drug lords of Colombia, the CIA, the FBI and the military. You really get to sympathize with him and everything he goes through."

Coincidentally, just days before our interview, the six-foot-two action figure went through some real-life drama, and drew sympathy from across Hollywood, when *Premiere* ran a story titled "Arnold the Barbarian," alleging he had groped female reporters during a press tour and was not entirely faithful to his wife of 15 years, TV journalist and Kennedy-clan member Maria Shriver.

"Guys can handle those things much better, but my wife's an innocent bystander," the 53-year-old former bodybuilder says with surprising calm and a shrug. While the story led to numerous public statements of support from friends including his *True Lies* co-star Jamie Lee Curtis, *Terminator* director James Cameron and *Terminator* co-star Linda Hamilton, the actor himself has chosen to let his life speak for itself.

"That's the way it is in show business," he explains. "It's all a play and you have to ride those waves and sometimes you go up the wave and it's a great experience, and then when you are going down it becomes like for every attack there's a defense. So you say, 'Okay, now this is a little attack here and we have to handle it.' But you never get discouraged or say this is typical journalism because my wife is a journalist and I don't put everyone in the same pot.

"I feel proud of the way I live my life, the way I treat my wife and what kind of family man I am. So it doesn't make me feel vulnerable," he adds.

Vulnerability has never been too prominent in Schwarzenegger's screen persona either. A versatile actor, producer, director and real estate mogul, the former Mr. Universe has flexed his comedy muscles in such hits as *Kindergarten Cop*, *Junior* and *Twins* but really seems to strike it big at the box office when he's flexing his real muscles in such hits as *Terminator*, *Total Recall* and *True Lies*.

A consummate expert on how to make hit movies, Arnie still laughs off questions about where he's headed next. "The new direction is really just to create movies for the audience today, not for the audience from yesterday, and if it means humour or no humour, more suspense or less suspense, whatever the audience really wants today you have got to be with the times," he says.

When reminded that a few years back he insisted he was only interested in doing movies with a message, the star grins. "Yes, and this one is about the absurdity of war and of what's going on with these guerrilla fights and people getting killed," he explains, adding that "collateral damage" is a euphemism for innocent civillians who get killed in crossfire.

Born in the tiny mountain town of Graz, Austria, Schwarzenegger is living proof of the American dream. Moving to the United States in 1968, the bodybuilder made his screen-acting debut in 1970's *Hercules in New York* under the name Arnold Strong. In 1982, he parlayed his bodybuilding reputation into a bona fide big-screen hero in *Conan the Barbarian*, and became a U.S. citizen a year later. He earned a major credibility boost with 1984's *The Terminator* — establishing his prophetic trademark line "I'll be back" — and then cemented his makeover by joining American nobility with his 1986 marriage to Shriver.

Asked about their relationship, Schwarzenegger lights up, relishing the opportunity to address what, from the outside, looks like the least likely of couples. "One of the things that is consistent is that you really have the ultimate of love for one another, which Maria and I have, as well as the ultimate respect," he begins. "With those two things you can solve a lot of problems because you have to understand that it is not easy to live with anyone, because you're always two different people. But then imagine those two people being Maria and I," he says with a smile.

"She comes from America, I come from Austria. She comes from a royal family and wealth and I come from a poor place where I have never heard of doing charitable works or anything like that. She also comes from [the] Democratic party, which is very close to a socialistic kind of political system, and I consider myself Republican. So we are opposites but we have the respect of one another...

"We have our ups and downs," he admits, "and Maria is always very understanding when we have our downs and visits me in the garage all the time," he says, finally breaking into an all-out chuckle. "But we also created four amazing children and that neutralizes everything and helps the love and respect keep us really moving forward."

The kids aren't the only things that have taught the couple there are more important things in life than their demanding, and often diverging, careers. Four years ago Arnold underwent heart surgery to repair a congenital defect in an aortic valve. "It was not an emergency of any kind and I was hiking up the mountains 14 days after the surgery," he brags. "I was fortunate that I decided to have the surgery early on because it was the same problem that my mother had and finally died of, and it's the same problem that my grandmother had. Surgeries like this make you live on for a longer period of time and eventually, hopefully, we'll have surgeries that can make you live on forever because it's the only thing that really makes me mad about life - that one day we have to die."

With that, the jovial actor heads back to the set, leaving no doubt that if anybody can achieve immortality, he'll be first in line.

## Kevin Spacey finally lives up to his Hollywood nickname, playing a supposed alien from outer space in *K-PAX* BY EARL DITTMAN

hortly before he began filming his Academy Award-winning turn in 1999's American Beauty, Kevin Spacey fell in love with another script — a sci-fi drama called *K-PAX*, about a mental patient named Prot who claims he's from a distant planet. Spacey was so anxious to get the role that as soon as he finished reading the screenplay he called his agent and manager.

"I picked up the phone and told them, 'Oh, my God, this is an extraordinary film and a fantastic part! I want to play this role so bad, I'll do it for nothing," Spacey recalls, as he scarfs down a late lunch at an upscale New York eatery. Dressed exquisitely in a black designer suit, the actor hovers over a large chef's salad, fending off an overly eager waiter who checks up on his VIP customer about every five minutes. "Of course," Spacey continues, "they didn't like the fact that I said I would play it for free, but they understood how badly I wanted to do it."

But before Spacey could finish telling his handlers exactly why he should star in the movie, he got the bad news.

"They said to me, 'We hate to tell you this Kevin, but Will Smith is already playing that role.' My heart just sank. But I kept asking them, 'Really? Are you sure?' hoping they were wrong.... Back then that had been happening to me a lot, where I would read something I liked but someone else was already doing it. So I just said, 'Oh well, maybe I just wasn't meant to do it."

Spacey went on to make American Beauty (which earned him his second Oscar, after The Usual Suspects), The Big Kahuna and Pay it Forward, but his hopes of starring in K-PAX never completely died. And when Smith opted out of the film to play boxing great Muhammad Ali in the bio-pic Ali, Spacey got the call — he had the role if he still wanted it.

"I was like, 'Are you kidding? Where do I report to start filming?"

Based on the novel by Gene Brewer and co-starring Jeff Bridges, Alfre Woodard and Mary McCormack, *K-PAX* follows Prot as he tries to convince doctors and his fellow patients in the mental institution that he is from another world. While his psychiatrist (Bridges) pegs him as delusional, Prot's descriptions of life on K-PAX — a planet 1,000 light years away — awaken a sense of hope among the other patients. Eventually, Prot reveals that he will be beaming back up to his own galaxy before the summer ends, and can take one person with him. As the day of Prot's departure nears, the other patients all pack their bags in the hope of joining him on his journey.

What Spacey liked best about the script, written by Bryan Goluboff and Charles Leavitt, was its raw emotional centre. "Even though it's a science fiction movie in a lot of ways, the emotions that run through it are very real, we can all relate to them," he explains. "There's a lot of truth in it, and it has a big heart."

New Jersey-born Kevin Spacey Fowler (Spacey is his mother's maiden name) was the baby of the family, having two older siblings. His mom was a secretary and his dad made a living as a technical writer. But erratic opportunities in the tech-writing field meant the family had to move around a lot. They eventually settled in Southern California, where Kevin's rebellious side surfaced. After burning down his sister's tree house, he was sent away to military school, but got turfed just a few months later for throwing a tire at another student.

Finally landing at Chatsworth High School in the San Fernando Valley, Spacey discovered that the drama program was a better way to get attention than setting things aflame. His classmates included Val Kilmer (*Red Planet*) and Brat Pack veteran Mare Winningham (*St. Elmo's Fire*), the latter playing Maria to Spacey's Captain von Trapp in Chatsworth's production of *The Sound of Music*.

After studying his craft at the Juilliard theatre school, Spacey started to work on Broadway where he appeared opposite his idol Jack Lemmon in a 1986 production of *Long Day's Journey into Night* and then won a Tony for a 1991 staging of *Lost in Yonkers*. He soon made the leap to the big screen with such notable roles as the manipulative office manager in 1992's *Glengarry Glen Ross* and the creepy villain in 1995's *Seven*.

In the years since, film fans have slowly gotten to know Spacey better and better on screen anyway. His personal life, however, is a different story. Never one to talk about who he's dating, or how he lives, Spacey has become somewhat of a mystery for the press.

"Last year I was on a cover of GQ and the tag line was 'Kevin Spacey Needs a Hug," he says. "I have no idea what that meant. I even started feeling sorry for myself after seeing that headline."

Rumours that he's gay abound in Hollywood, but the actor has denied them, saying nothing has helped his luck with the ladies more than those tales because they all want to "convert" him.

As for his tight-lipped approach, he says it helps his craft. "I really don't understand everyone's obsession with having to know every little detail of an actor's life," he says. "It really borders on the ridiculous. I'm not trying to become an enigma or anything by not talking about my personal life, I'm just trying to keep some distance between myself and the people I play on stage or in movies. The more you know about me, the less you are going to believe I'm a certain character. It's as simple as that."

And Spacey claims the awards, superstar salaries and fame haven't changed the way he chooses which of those characters to play. "I approach my career the same way I did in high school, when I was doing plays. I respond to the material," he says. "I don't necessarily want to know who else is in it, who's directing it or how much money they are offering me. I don't want to know any of that. I just want to read the story. And if I respond to the story, then I do what I did in high school, which is go around saying, 'This is a f---ing great story. This is a beautiful story. I want to play this part."

Spacey's next beautiful story will be director Lasse Hallström's adaptation of the Pulitzer-Prize winning The Shipping News, scheduled for release this holiday season. In a cast that also includes Julianne Moore, Judi Dench and Cate Blanchett, Spacey plays an emotionally beaten man who moves, with his young daughter, to his ancestral home in Newfoundland to reclaim his life. Filmed in and around Nova Scotia and Newfoundland this past spring, The Shipping News is already generating plenty of buzz. Strangely, though, it might have been John Travolta's performance, rather than Spacey's, that had insiders excited.


"Like *K-PAX*, the same thing happened to me when I read *The Shipping News*. I read it and loved it. But, once again, I was told it was already taken. It was a John Travolta movie. But, somehow, some way, his association with it fell apart. Luckily, I had worked long and hard enough so that when it came back around, it came to me," Spacey explains.

"I may be the one getting seconds when it comes to parts, but they certainly aren't sloppy seconds. I just thank my lucky stars that other actors change their minds as much as they do."

### Coldheart Canyon: A Hollywood Ghost Story By Clive Barker HarperCollins, \$42





#### WHICH FILM BASED ON ONE OF YOUR SCRIPTS WERE YOU HAPPIEST WITH?

"Probably *Speed* because we were all on the same page. When I saw it I thought the elevator sequence at the beginning was okay, [director] Jan [de Bont] has a style that's crisp and clean, and I thought it could have been messier. But once it got onto the bus it was as good as anything I had imagined, or better."

### WHICH FILM BASED ON ONE OF YOUR SCRIPTS WERE YOU LEAST HAPPY WITH?

"Mission to Mars. I came onto it as a project that other people had already been working on. There was this one sequence, in particular, where the spacecraft was hit by micrometeors and decompresses. After having worked on *From the Earth to the Moon*, I learned that when that happens you really bounce around so I saw it as a sequence with them flying around in zero gravity like it's never been done before. But they didn't do it like that."

#### IF YOU COULD LIVE IN ANY MOVIE, WHAT WOULD IT BE?

"Well, it's not a movie yet, but *Lord of the Rings*. That book changed my life. I would just stare at the map and try to imagine all the different places and what they were like. I'm very excited, I have great hopes for the movie."

#### IF YOU COULD WRITE FOR ANY ACTOR, WHO WOULD IT BE?

"It would be a guy I've worked with twice but never written for — Tom Hanks. I think he's pretty much the best American actor right now. He doesn't go very far afield, all of his characters are variations of himself. But to every role he brings feeling, empathy, reality and intelligence. I go to a Tom Hanks movie and I'm pretty sure I'm not going to be disappointed." —Marni Weisz

## **Graham Yost** makes his picks

e grew up in Toronto the son of Elwy Yost, host of two beloved film shows on TVOntario — Saturday Night at the Movies and Magic Shadows. But in 1994, screenwriter Graham Yost made a name for himself in the movie biz when one of his scripts was turned into a little flick called Speed. The action pic's immense success made the Canadian writer an instant commodity in Hollywood, allowing him to split his time between writing his own scripts — like Broken Arrow, Hard Rain, and parts of the Tom Hanks HBO series From the Earth to the Moon, and retooling existing scripts for movies like Mission to Mars and this month's Robert Redford film, The Last Castle.

The latter was written with newbie screenwriter David Scarpa, and tells of a three-star general (Redford) who disobeys an order in a "Rwanda-like situation," is court-martialled and sentenced to a maximum security prison where he inspires his fellow inmates to revolt.

Yost now lives in Carmel, California with his wife and two kids, but was at his office just up the coast in Monterey ("If I stand in one corner on my tiptoes I can see the ocean") when he spoke with *Famous* about his most-loved flicks, his new film and his dream writing assignment.

#### WHAT ARE YOUR FIVE FAVOURITE FILMS?

"Number one is **Citizen Kane** [1941], which is something that my dad forced me to watch when I was 12 or 13, and I didn't get what all the fuss was about. Then I saw it again in college. The thing about *Kane*, to me, is that it's truly timeless. And, for a Canadian, it's the quintessential American story. • Number two is **Godfather** [1972] and **Godfather II** [1974]. Coppola was firing on all cylinders, it just looks effortless. And *Godfather II* is not just a sequel, he took these characters deeper, to the point where Michael can order the murder of his own brother. • Number three is **Mad Max 2: The Road Warrior** [1981]. The final 20 minutes, where Mel Gibson is driving away from these hooligans, is an amazing sequence, brilliantly


