avid Alpay may blend in with the thousands of students roaming the grounds of the University of Toronto this month, but he's really one of a kind. The 20-year-old human biology major is the only student on campus starring in the opening-night film of the Toronto International Film Festival — Atom Egoyan's Ararat.

"It's strange because all my best friends kneel before me," quips Alpay. "No, that's not true." He pauses. "I wish they did."

Perhaps the adulation will come in November when Ararat opens in theatres across the country. Alpay plays Raffi, a young man working on the production of an epic film about the Armenian genocide that took place in the early 1900s. While working on the project, his character is forced to confront memories of his father, his mother's denial of her past and his relationship

with his step-sister. The film also stars Christopher Plummer, Charles Aznavour, Arsinée Khanjian and Eric Bogosian.


Last year, Alpay was taking a break from writing an essay when he came across a casting call for extras to appear in Egovan's new movie. A week after auditioning he was asked to come in and meet with the director. "I thought it would be neat to be in the background somewhere in the film," explains Alpay. "So this was completely unexpected."

Except for a couple of roles in university theatre productions, Alpay had no acting experience going into Ararat. "My training happened on the spot. They throw you into hot water and expect you to cool it somehow," he says, crediting co-stars like Plummer with giving him pointers. "He made my job very simple."

The budding thespian found himself

in the glare of the global spotlight last May when Ararat had its world premiere at the Cannes film festival, but it wasn't the first time Alpay had been under pressure. In 1999 he represented Earl Haig Secondary School at the National Brain Bee Championships in Maryland and won both a scholarship and the title of Best Brain by correctly answering the question: "Neurons containing what neurotransmitter preferentially die in Alzheimer's patients?" (The answer is acetylcholine — but you knew that, right?)

Alpay has applied to pursue his PhD at several Canadian universities but is also considering studying at the University of California at Irvine. Does he plan to balance academics with acting? "I wish I could say 'yes' for sure but I really don't know because I know there's stuff to do in medical school even during the summers," he admits. "Ideally, the best situation would be school, school and then during the summer maybe do a small project. That would be kind of neat. That would be rewarding."

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FILM FESTIVAL SEASON IS IN HIGH GEAR WITH FOUR MAJOR EVENTS TAKING PLACE ACROSS CANADA THIS MONTH AND EARLY NEXT

■ It's salt water and celluloid from September 13 to 21 at the 22nd Atlantic Film Festival in Halifax. And although the lineup had vet to be announced at press time. festival director Lia Rinaldo says audiences can expect about 200 features and shorts.

The event divides films into several different programs including Atlantic Focus, **Canadian Perspectives and International** Perspectives.

Rinaldo says last year's festival attracted about 16,000 people — an impressive number considering the terrorist attacks in the U.S. just days before. And that growing popularity has made acquiring films much easier. "A lot has changed," says Rinaldo. "The film industry





Bio bits: On the surface, it seems like Kate Hudson was destined to be a star. Her mom is actor Goldie Hawn, who raised her alongside celebrity step-dad Kurt Russell in the glittery confines of upscale L.A. But, truth is, if not for a regrettable choice by a well-known Canadian actor, Hudson might have missed her

big break as a free-spirited groupie in Cameron Crowe's *Almost Famous* — a role that had already been handed to Sarah Polley.

Depending on your source, Polley either pulled out of the project to do another film, or didn't think she could do the role justice. And that's when Hudson, who had already signed on for a small part as the lead character's sister, was bumped up to play Penny Lane. The then-21-year-old earned an Oscar nomination for her performance.

Born April 19, 1979 in L.A., Hudson was just 18 months old when her mother and father, singer/comedian Bill Hudson, divorced, and just three when her mom hooked up with actor Kurt Russell on the set of the World War Two pic *Swing Shift*. Since then, Kate has thought of Russell as her real dad, although she reportedly has no ill feelings toward her biological father.

Perhaps Kate was destined to be a star — *Almost Famous*, or not. As a child, she would sing and dance whenever someone sat still long enough to watch, and with her extended family, there were many. There was her brother Oliver, half-brother Wyatt (Hawn and Russell's offspring), step-brother Boston (Russell's son from a previous marriage), and step-siblings Emily and Zachary on Hudson's side.

As a little girl, Kate was also indoctrinated into showbiz by spending long hours on her parents' film sets, where she preferred hanging out with the camera crew, makeup and wardrobe people, to spending time with the stars.

When she graduated from the Crossroads performing arts school in Santa Monica, Goldie and Kurt hoped she'd further her studies at New York University. But Kate opted to jump right into acting, making her debut with an appearance on TV's *Party of Five* as the girl who came between Justin and Julia in the 1996 season finale.

Following *Four Feathers*, Hudson will appear in the Merchantlvory comedy *Le Divorce* as a film school dropout who moves to Paris to help her abandoned pregnant sister, only to fall in love

with a 70-year-old Parisian.

Now appearing in... Stealing Harvard as a young man who, along with his best friend (Tom Green), sets out on a crime spree to pay for his niece's Harvard tuition.

Bio bits: Jason Lee — no relation to fellow actor Jason Scott Lee — was born April 25, 1970, in Orange, California and grew up in Huntington Beach. Early on, all signs pointed to a future on the half-pipe, not the big screen. Lee started skateboarding at age 5 and was part of the pro-skateboard circuit by the time he was 18. He and a friend tapped into the booming skateboard market by creating two companies, Stereo Skateboards and Stereo Sounds Clothing.

Lee's interest in being in front of cameras began after he moved to Los Angeles in the early 90s, when he was asked to show off his skateboarding talents in several music videos, including Sonic Youth's 100%, directed by Spike Jonze. In 1993, Lee landed a small part opposite Jonze as a teenaged drug buyer in *Mi vida loca* — and he was hooked on acting.

His first audition for director Kevin Smith earned Lee a leading role as Jeremy London's cynical sidekick Brodie Bruce in *Mallrats* (1995). Smith was so impressed, he later cast Lee in *Chasing Amy* (1997) as Ben Affleck's cranky roommate, Banky Edwards. The part earned Lee an Independent Spirit Award. (Smith used Lee again in 1999's *Dogma* and brought him back as both Brodie Bruce and Banky Lee in last year's *Jay and Silent Bob Strike Back*.)

Several small roles in small projects followed before Lee scored parts in 1998 opposite *Friends* star David Schwimmer in *Kissing a Fool* and with Will Smith in *Enemy of the State*. The following year — in addition to *Dogma* — Lee had a role in *Mumford* as an eccentric young billionaire. Next was a high-profile part in Cameron Crowe's *Almost Famous*, wherein he played the lead singer of fictional 70s rock band Stillwater. Like Smith, Crowe wanted to use Lee again, and cast him alongside Tom Cruise in *Vanilla Sky*.

Lee's acting career shows no signs of slowing down. After *Stealing Harvard*, he will be seen with Julia Stiles and Selma Blair in *A Guy Thing*, followed by parts in *Dreamcatcher* with Morgan Freeman and in *Jersey Girl*. He is also working with Kevin Smith again on *Fletch Won*.

### James FRANCO

Now appearing in... City by the Sea as Joey LaMarca, the suspect in a murder case investigated by his cop father (Robert De Niro).

**Bio bits:** James Edward Franco might be the only person to go from the Golden Arches to the Golden Globes in just four years. The young actor who, at 18, paid for acting courses by working at McDonald's, won a Golden Globe this year for his portrayal of screen legend James Dean in a TV bio-pic.


Franco was born into a family of artists on April 19, 1978. Both his mother Betsy and his uncle Michael Verne are authors, his late grandfather was a cartoonist and his grandmother runs an art gallery in Cleveland. The eldest of three boys, Franco grew up a bit of a loner in Palo Alta, California, and endured taunts and teasing throughout high school. After classes he rushed to the

Palo Alto Art League where he pursued his passion for painting, often staying until late at night. A jealous Franco also joined his school's drama department after finding out that his girlfriend had a kissing scene with another boy. It wasn't his first taste of acting, though — in Grade 7 he co-wrote and starred in a play about golf for a drama competition.

After high school he enrolled at UCLA to study English Literature but, frustrated that first- and second-year students

couldn't take acting classes, he dropped out and signed up for acting lessons at Robert Carnegie's Playhouse West. Cut off financially by his family, Franco lived with friends and supported himself by working at a McDonald's drive-through. Upon signing with an agent, he left the fast food business and landed a part in a Pizza Hut commercial, followed by small parts on TV series like The X-Files and Pacific Blue, and opposite Drew Barrymore in the feature film Never Been Kissed. His first real break may have been as nihilistic burn-out Daniel Desario in the critically acclaimed, but short-lived, NBC series Freaks and Geeks, which he followed with the decidedly less-acclaimed teen comedy Whatever it Takes. In one scene Franco was stripped down to a thong, blindfolded and tied to a bed. That may have got audiences' attention, but it wasn't until he took on the title role in the 2001 TV movie James Dean that Hollywood really took notice.

To bring Dean to life, Franco studied the actor's work, started chain smoking and isolated himself from his family and friends for six months. His performance earned him a Golden Globe and a nomination for a Screen Actors Guild Award, and led to high-profile parts in the summer blockbuster *Spider-Man* (as Harry Osborn) and this season's *City by the Sea* with Robert DeNiro.



fter years of being thought of as either the boyfriend of the most famous actress on the planet or as the partner of the veteran cop on one of television's longest-running, highest-rated police dramas, Benjamin Bratt has finally moved out of the shadows. And, while he has no regrets about dating Julia Roberts for three years or starring as a homicide detective on Law & Order for four seasons, the 38-year-old admits it feels good to be standing front and centre for a change.

"It's not like I've been craving attention or thinking, 'Why doesn't anybody notice me," jokes the handsome, sixfoot-two actor. "I've just been working hard for the ability to choose the type of projects I respect and have people judge my work in them based on my performances — not because of who I'm with or what I've been in before."

If his vivid portrayal of the late Latin poet, playwright and actor Miguel Piñero in last year's *Piñero* didn't convince moviegoers, his co-starring role in next month's nail-biter *Abandon* just might.

The film centres on Katie Burke (Dawson's Creek's Katie Holmes), a college senior attempting to complete her thesis, ace her exams and prepare for the endless interviews that will, with hope, land her a prestigious, highpaying job. But, just when she doesn't think she can handle much more, her problems are compounded by the arrival of Alvin Handler (Bratt), a police detective who wants to question her about the mysterious, two-year-old disappearance of her former boyfriend (Charlie Hunnam). Recounting her relationship with the missing beau, Katie is pushed to her breaking point. But Detective Handler is determined to find out what happened. As he presses

her to recall the disturbing memories, they both discover surprising secrets about her former love. And, before long, Katie comes to the terrifying realization that she knows more about his disappearance than she thought.

"It's a really intense psychological drama, unlike any you've seen before," Bratt says, opening the balcony doors of his Beverly Hills hotel room to let in a cool Southern California breeze. "That's what made it so attractive. We've all seen hundreds of the typical 'girl in distress from unknown forces' films. I didn't want to do another one of those. Abandon brings a whole new twist to the genre. Also, my character was interesting on paper. You never really know who he is or what his motives really are. I wanted to take this cop in a whole different direction and, luckily, [writer/director Stephen Gaghan's] script allowed for that. To be honest, I kind of promised myself I'd never play another cop role. After four years of being a detective it's the last role on your list of possible parts you want to play."

Bratt arrived in Hollywood in the late-'80s and started racking up both TV and film roles — from guest spots on such television shows as Nasty Boys, Knightwatch and Police Story: Gladiator School to supporting parts in films like The River Wild, Clear and Present Danger and Demolition Man.

In 1994, he moved to New York to replace Chris Noth on *Law & Order* and became an instant hit with TV critics and fans, boosting ratings and helping the program maintain its Top Ten status. But when his contract was up for renewal four years later, he decided to leave. It was an unexpected and, many thought, risky move. Bratt, though, had his reasons.

"I just knew that after being on the show for four years that, creatively, it was time to move on," the actor recalls, removing his black leather jacket. "I mean. I had an awareness that it was the best job that I had ever had, and the decision to leave would be tough. But there was a combination of things involved in that decision. One, I was born and raised in California and my family is still in Northern California. Much of the day-to-day interaction that I had become used to before the show was missing from my life. I really wanted to spend more time with my family. Also, from a creative point of view — as good of a job as Law & Order was - I felt a little artistically handcuffed. I mean, there are only so many ways you can remain creative by asking questions like 'Do you recall the license plate?' or 'Do you know any reasons why someone would want to hurt your husband?'"

Even though he missed being with his mother (a Peruvian Indian from Lima) and father (an American of English and German ancestry), filming in New York also cut down on the time he was able to spend with his thengirlfriend, Roberts. While he's never admitted she played a role in his decision to leave the show, many close to Bratt have said their bi-coastal relationship was putting a strain on their union.

Once he relocated to Los Angeles, the pair was inseparable. By the end of the millennium, you couldn't pass a newsstand without seeing Bratt and Roberts, arm in arm, on the cover of some magazine, and they did little to discourage rumours that they would soon be wed. Bratt's first post-Law & Order project, The Next Best Thing, offered the actor a welcome change of pace. "I wasn't allowed to smile much as Detective Curtis, so it was a relief to do a

comedy," he remembers. "And doing a film with Madonna and Rupert Everett seemed like a no-brainer to me."

But *The Next Best Thing* was a boxoffice disappointment and, to make things worse, practically every reporter Bratt spoke with about the film asked the same question: "What's it like to be the boyfriend of Hollywood's biggest female star?" Even when his comedy with Sandra Bullock, *Miss Congeniality*, became a hit, interviewers focused on his relationship with Roberts instead of his contribution to the film.

"You can never control what the media does, it's all out of your hands, especially if you are a celebrity," Bratt explains, "It's like one big circus or free-for-all. And it's a business. They are trying to sell papers or magazines."

In June 2001, Bratt and Roberts announced — through their representatives — that they were no longer a couple and the tabloids wondered, "Was Bratt tired of being thought of as 'Mr. Roberts?'" Bratt will only offer, "'She's a wonderful person and a great actress. I will always fondly remember the time we had together."

### CHARLIE SHINES

e was voted one of *F.M.* magazine's Top 50 sexiest Brit Actors of 2001, and he was in the running for the coveted role of Anakin Skywalker in *Star Wars: Attack of the Clones.* But it's likely you've never heard of Charlie Hunnam.

And yet the 22-year-old is being described by insiders as "the one to watch." Audiences can do just that when he shows up in *Abandon* as Katie Holmes' ex who mysteriously reappears on the campus of her university.

So who is Charlie Hunnam? Fans of the British series *Queer as Folk* already know him as Nathan Maloney, a 15-year-old who comes out into Manchester's gay scene. It was a controversial role that required plenty of nudity and steamy sex scenes, but it earned him a large and loyal following. It also lead to his first big-screen role in the British comedy *Whatever Happened to Harold Smith?* 

Hunnam then moved to L.A., where he landed roles in two short-lived TV series, Fox's *Undeclared* and the WB's *Young Americans. Abandon* is his first Hollywood flick, but he will play the title character in an adaptation of Dickens' *Nicholas Nickleby*,




due out this Christmas, and will appear in next year's Civil War drama *Cold Mountain* with Nicole Kidman and Jude Law.

Born in Newcastle, England, Hunnam owes his acting career to a pair of sneakers. He was in a shoe store when he asked another customer what she thought of his cross-trainers. That customer turned out to be a production manager for *Byker Grove*, a British TV series for teens, who took Hunnam to meet the director. A part on the show, and then two more series, followed before his big break on *Queer as Folk*.

Sorry girls — and some of you guys — Hunnam is married to actress Katherine Towne, daughter of screenwriter Robert Towne (*Chinatown*, *Mission Impossible*). —JK

However, as one door closed, others began to open — like the role in *Piñero*. He threw himself into the part, even altering his appearance to look more like the late drugaddicted, Tony-winning playwright. "I wanted to approximate the physical nature of being a heroin addict and his emaciation at the time of his death," he explains. "So I lost a significant amount of weight, let the hair grow and grew a beard and mustache. But, contrary to what was reported, I did continue to shower. I'm not that much of a Method Actor."

Many predicted he would score a Best Actor Oscar nomination for his work in *Piñero*, and when he didn't, they blamed it on the indie film's inability to mount a costly Academy Award campaign. Regardless, he had gained the industry's respect.

Piñero also improved another part of Bratt's life. During its filming, he met his future wife, Talisa Soto, who co-starred as Piñero's prostitute girlfriend. (You may remember Soto as Antonio Banderas' doomed love Maria in 1992's *The Mambo Kings* or Bond Girl Lupe Lamora in 1989's *Licence to Kill.*) They married this past spring and are expecting their first child any time now.

"No matter how hard you try to control your life, it's going to take you where you belong," Bratt muses. "I think I've always known that, deep down. That's why I haven't been afraid to take chances. Sure, I could still be on Law & Order, but would I have done Piñero or Abandon or formed my own production company [Chacras FilmWorks]? Probably not. I know my personal life would certainly be different. All you can do is be a good person, work hard, love those close to you and have faith. The rest is up to destiny. It'll put you where you need to be. And, right now, it's landed me in the best place I've ever been in my life."

### 8 MILE >> NOVEMBER

Stars: Eminem, Kim Basinger

**Director: Curtis Hanson (L.A. Confidential)** 

Story: Although it was first announced as a bio-pic of leading man Eminem, somewhere along the way 8 Mile transformed into the story of a generic young man who struggles to overcome the limitations of growing up poor in a rough part of Detroit. Before you dismiss this one as yet another cliché Boyz N the Hood wannabe, know that director Hanson's last two flicks — L.A. Confidential and Wonder Boys — were both multiple-Oscar nominees. Plus, you get to see Eminem's natural hair colour.

### HARRY POTTER AND THE CHAMBER OF SECRETS >> NOVEMBER

Stars: Daniel Radcliffe, Rupert Grint

Director: Chris Columbus (Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone)
Story: It's Harry's second year at Hogwarts and all is not well.
People are being turned to stone and no one knows why. It could have something to do with the voices Harry's hearing from within the academy's walls. It could have something to do with the reopening of the Chamber of Secrets. But when people start to think Harry's behind it, he has to prove them wrong.

### STAR TREK: NEMESIS >> DECEMBER

Stars: Patrick Stewart, Brent Spiner Director: Stuart Baird (U.S. Marshals)

Story: While we know Romulus and Remus as the mythological founders of Rome, in the *Star Trek* universe they are the two Romulan home worlds. How can the names refer to both an Earthbound legend, and planets inhabited by pointy-eared people 2 million years ago? We have no idea, but presumably the film will explain. In this 10th *Star Trek* pic, the Romulans are finally trying to forge a lasting peace with the Federation. 
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



















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REESE WITHERSPOON ON MARRIAGE, MOTHERHOOD AND RETURNING TO HER SOUTHERN ROOTS FOR SWEET HOME ALABAMA BY EARL DITTMAN

f there's an actress in Hollywood who has her cake and can eat it, too, it's Reese Witherspoon. The 26-year-old Tinsel Town vet (she made her film debut at 16 in 1991's touching *Man in the Moon*) has not only become a critically lauded and highly-paid performer (taking home \$5-million [U.S.] for *Sweet Home Alabama*), but she also has a seemingly happy marriage and a two-year-old daughter with screen hunk Ryan Phillippe. And what's most surprising is that it doesn't seem like many of her ultra-competitive contemporaries begrudge the star of last year's surprise hit *Legally Blonde* her ability to maintain a flop-free career and a fairy tale personal life.

"You can't help but love Reese, because she's the absolute real deal in this jaded town filled with fakes and egomaniacs," says Rupert Everett, her co-star from this past spring's adaptation of the Oscar Wilde classic *The Importance of Being* 

Earnest. "Most actors are jealous of others who have a run of good luck. But Reese is one Cinderella everyone is rooting for. It's almost sickening."

The Tennessee-born actress, decked out in a simple pair of jeans, Givenchy top and Moschino shoes, blushes when offered Everett's assessment. "Rupert's just trying to make sure he stays on my Christmas list, that's why he says such nice things," jokes the 5' 2" blonde as she plops herself down on a big chair in her New York hotel suite.

Having just wrapped the romantic comedy *Sweet Home Alabama* — about a woman with white trash roots who leaves the south only to fall in love with a Big Apple socialite —

Witherspoon was in New York to meet with writers and directors concerning an upcoming project for her production company Type A Films. "It's important for me to have my own production company because I'm not the kind of person who sits on her hands very well and just waits for things to come to me," Witherspoon explains. "It's really exciting being a part of a project from the very beginning, getting to know the writer and being able to pick an appropriate director for the material."

### [Q] Producer, actor, wife and mom. Is there anything you can't do?

[A] "Well, I'm not as good at changing diapers as Ryan is. I started out as a neophyte in that situation. Ryan's mom had a daycare centre, so he can do a diaper like you wouldn't believe. I mean, like five seconds flat. I have definitely learned a few things from him."

### [Q] What can you tell us about Sweet Home Alabama?

[A] "It's about a woman who is a New York fashion designer who is about to marry the greatest New York socialite guy [Patrick Dempsey]. But it turns out that she has a little dark secret — she's a white trash girl already married to the guy that she grew up with [Josh Lucas] in Alabama. She married him when she was a teenager. So she has to sort of go down and extract herself from the marriage, but it's not that easy. It's really funny and it's really romantic. I'm really proud of the movie."

### [Q] Could you relate to your character?

[A] "In a way. I'm from Tennessee, from the sticks, and I've

had to adapt to an environment where money and proper etiquette are expected, even if it's meaningless. I think all women can relate to hiding little things to impress the people they are dating. It's a universal feeling, and it's treated with heart and a real sense of humour in the film."

#### [Q] Do you prefer doing comedies to dramas?

[A] "I like doing both, but I really love doing comedies."

### [Q] Are you going to do a Legally Blonde 2?

[A] "Yeah. I don't know much about it right now. I haven't read it. We'll see."

[Q] Are you surprised at how well *Legally Blonde* did at the box office? [A] "I'm still waiting for them to tell me it was all a joke and that it really went straight to video [laughs]."

### [Q] Do you feel like a role model for other young, successful twentysomethings who are getting married earlier in life?

[A] "I don't think I'm influencing a lot of young women to go out and get married. It's not like all those new brides don't love their husbands. I'm sure they didn't want to be married really young so that they could be like me. I hope not, because I don't feel like I'm a big influence on people. I just happen to have a good career, a great husband and a wonderful child. That's all."

### [Q] Does it worry you that most marriages between actors and actresses don't last?

[A] "Listen, other people's business is

their business, and I can't really be concerned just because other people are breaking up. It doesn't mean I'm going to go break up. You have to sort of exist in your own reality and not be too worried about other people's business."

### [Q] How do you improve your chances?

[A] "I think you always have to focus on your family — that's my first priority. And Ryan and I were both raised in very strong family structures. Both of our parents are still together. So we feel very strongly about that."

### [Q] Can you have a normal life when both of you are stars and being hounded by the paparazzi?

[A] "Sure, you can have a normal life. But you can't control the paparazzi. So, if they want to chase me down and watch me change dirty diapers, that's their prerogative. I can't imagine that being that exciting."

### [Q] How did your parents feel about you going into acting?

[A] "I think that my parents always expected the unconventional with me. I mean, being a seven-year-old and turning to them and saying, 'Mommy, I want to be an actress,' completely confused them, since they were both physicians. But I'm just glad that my parents were really supportive with what I chose to do. However, I still think that they're a little disappointed that I didn't turn out to be a surgeon."

### [Q] You dropped out of Stanford after one year. Will you ever go back?

[A] "Maybe, but it's not a real priority."

### [Q] Any regrets about quitting?

[A] "No, because Robert Benton [who directed her in 1998's *Twilight*] called me and asked if I wanted to do a movie with Paul Newman, Susan Sarandon and Gene Hackman, and I said, 'Hmm, do I want to continue with Psyche 101 or do a movie with Paul Newman?' It wasn't a hard decision. I was like, 'Pack me up, I'll see you girls later.'"

### [Q] How has motherhood changed you?

[A] "It's sort of indescribable. I mean, so much of your life changes that it definitely puts your life into perspective. Changing dirty diapers every day and cleaning the peanut butter and jelly sandwiches off of your face makes it's hard to see yourself as a glamorous movie star."

[A] "Well, right now I play tennis because I'm working on a movie about tennis with my production company. I play a couple of times a week. Then I lift weights with a trainer."

He was so disappointed."

[A] "I feel very lucky, and I feel very blessed. But I just constantly remind myself that I'm just a little girl from Tennessee. When Ryan and I were at the Oscars, we walked up at rehearsal and were blown away when we saw our faces on those little placards and we were sitting right up front. I nearly started to cry. I was like, 'I can't believe that I've made it this far. I never even dreamt that it was possible."




### A BARE ROLE FOR MONKEYS

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



#### **BACK AND BLUE**

#### **BLUE RODEO RETURNS WITH THE R&B-HEAVY ALBUM**

**PALACE OF GOLD** | BY MICHAEL WHITE



always think that people will be all for change," says Jim Cuddy, who co-founded Blue Rodeo with fellow singer-guitarist Greg Keelor 17 years ago. His faith in the band's extensive fan base will be put to the test when the Toronto quintet's ninth studio album, *Palace of Gold*, hits streets on September 24.

Throughout a career that has netted them nine platinum albums and domestic sales of more than two-million units, a great deal of Blue Rodeo's enduring appeal has been thanks to the reliability of their sound: a melodic and accessible merging of vintage country and rock styles that recalls artists such as The Byrds, The Everly Brothers and Bob Dylan.

But every musician knows there's a perilously thin line between a reliable trademark and a tired formula. So, when Cuddy read Soulsville U.S.A., an exhaustive biography of legendary Memphis 'Southern soul' label Stax Records (home to Isaac Hayes, Booker T. & the MG's and Otis Redding), he immediately had a vision of the band's future. Blue Rodeo had long been fans of R&B — its influence often providing a subtle undercurrent to their records. For Palace of Gold, however, the band went a little further. Like Stax, whose in-house studio was based out of a disused movie theatre, Blue Rodeo bought an old storefront on Toronto's Danforth Avenue, gutting the interior and turning it into a studio of their own. Then, in the tradition of the classic soul sounds of the '60s and '70s, they incorporated a four-piece horn section, and hired local string players to add lush orchestration to several new songs.

"I think that one of the characteristics that Greg and I both share is that we just pursue things blindly," says Cuddy, chuckling. "It never occurred to us that it would be bad at all. We just sort of plowed ahead."

Fortunately, *Palace of Gold* is the freshest and most inspired Blue Rodeo album since 1993's sextuple-platinum *Five Days in July*. Its embellished instrumentation elevates ballads like "Bulletproof" and "Glad to be Alive" to a level of grandeur that today's poprarely possesses, while the rollicking "Walk Like You Don't Mind" arguably rocks harder than any Blue Rodeo song in a decade.

Palace of Gold arrives more than two years after its predecessor, The Days in Between — the longest gap ever between Blue Rodeo albums. Cuddy explains that the extra time was essential if the band's new direction was to be a success, and for the costly acquisition of their own studio to be justified.

"It was a great opportunity we provided ourselves with, to be able to go slowly and to figure out how to work the horns and strings into the songs, to think about things overnight," he says. "More often than not — 99 percent of the time — when we've recorded, we're under the gun either financially or time-wise, and you have to make decisions really quickly. Obviously, music done in a rush still has great value, but you're often left with this very unsatisfied feeling by the things you've had to leave in. This time, of course, we ran the risk of being so indulgent that we never finished."

Freed at last from the confines of the studio, Blue Rodeo will bring their horn players with them on the upcoming *Palace of Gold* cross-Canada tour, as well as a string section in selected cities. The band workshopped this expanded lineup at a handful of concerts over the past year, and Cuddy is thrilled to report that audience feedback was among the best in their history.

"You know, that's an exciting time in a band's career," he marvels, "when you've been going 17 years, and all of a sudden you enter into a phase where you're as excited as you've been in at least 10 years."

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## SEX, DRUGS AND NASTY ROLES

#### PARENTS AND TEENS FIND CONTENT REVIEW SITES USEFUL — FOR DIFFERENT REASONS

ex, nudity, violence and profanity
— even in today's rather liberal
society, many parents are trying to
protect their children from some or all
of these things. That's why a number of
websites have popped up to offer
detailed content reviews of movies and
videos. For concerned parents, these
sites provide valuable information about
the movies their children might be
going to see. But for teenagers with
raging hormones, these sites are handy
guides to finding sex, nudity and violence in movies. What 15-year-old boy

buff, Judy created *Screen It!* in March 1996 because friends and co-workers were always asking him if certain movies were okay for their kids to watch. The service became so popular (in *Yahoo Internet Life* magazine, film critic Roger Ebert described it as one of the five most useful sites in the world) that Judy quit his government job in August 1997 to work on the site full-time. It takes him roughly 10 hours to see and then write about each movie, so he focuses mostly on mainstream films in wide release.

But if Screen It! is intended to

help parents decide which movies their minor children can see, why does the site include reviews of R-rated and unrated films? "Because many teenagers still want to see R-rated and unrated films, and both could have either just a few f-words or nonstop profanity, sex and violence that earned them the R rating," Judy explains. "And many adults with no kids, or those who have already grown up, are con-

cerned for themselves."

Some other review sites, like *Grading* the *Movies* [www.gradingthemovies.com] rate only G and PG movies.

Judy, who lives in Washington, D.C., insists he is not imposing his morality on anyone. "I keep all religious, social and political agendas out of the reviews," he says, comparing *Screen It!* to a food package that lists the ingredients but doesn't tell consumers if it's good or bad for them. Aris Christofides, editor and publisher of *Kids-in-Mind* [www.kids-in-mind.com] uses the same analogy to describe his Cincinnati-based site. He explains his staff of eight uses the "prevailing cultural norms in North America and Western Europe" to determine what is potentially objectionable.

Christofides says he's aware that some



wouldn't want to see the Mexican film Y Tu Mama También, for example, after reading the details of its sexual content at Screen It! [www.screenit.com] — the tamest section of which reads, "We see Tenoch and Ana having sex (missionary position) with graphic movement, sounds and nudity (his bare butt, her bare breasts, part of her bare butt)."

"To each his own," concedes *Screen It!* founder Jim Judy. "There will always be those who use/abuse most any service in ways it was not originally intended."

Judy's site reviews new movies and videos for more than just sex and violence, though. Categories include: alcohol/drugs, disrespectful/bad attitude, frightening/tense scenes, imitative behaviour, profanity and smoking.


people are using the information on the site to specifically seek out movies with sex or violence. "There's nothing we can do about that, but we don't want the site to be titillating," he explains. "Personally, I find reading our reviews boring. It's not something anyone would read for pleasure." Christofides claims he has received feedback from teenagers who use the site to convince their parents that a certain R-rated movie is alright for them to see.

Screen It!'s creator says it's up to parents to choose films that are suitable for their children. "There are plenty of religious-based reviews that say that certain films are 'evil,'" says Judy. "We'll leave that up to the parents to decide based on the information we provide."

He's referring to sites run by the Christian organizations Crosswalk [www.movies.crosswalk.com] and the Child Care Action Project [www.capalert.com], which uses a complicated rating system and has reviews that are based on "the teachings and expectations of Jesus Christ...never changing with the slippery tides of modern morality." Look out, Tom Green.

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

#### **MAKES HIS PICKS**

e may be an All-American hunk, but 24-year-old Matthew Davis actually kicked off his movie career right here in Canada, playing twins in the forgettable made-in-Toronto feature *Urban Legends: Final Cut.* He avoided being typecast in teen slasher flicks only to sign on for a string of war films — *Tigerland, Pearl Harbor* and the forthcoming submarine pic *Below.* But audiences never really paid much attention to the handsome Salt Lake City native until he played Reese Witherspoon's ex-boyfriend, Warner Huntington III, in last year's comedy hit *Legally Blonde.* Davis most recently showed up in this summer's *Blue Crush* as the object of Kate Bosworth's affection. Currently working on some screenplay ideas of his own, he spoke with *Famous* from his home in Los Angeles.

#### WHAT ARE YOUR FIVE FAVOURITE FILMS?

"Number one is Chinatown [1974]. I'm a huge fan of [screenwriter] Robert Towne and I thought it captured the essence of what I would imagine Los Angeles to be at the time. I think the performances in it are absolutely amazing and Roman Polanski's direction was great. • Number two is The Godfather [1972]. That's just kind of a given. • Number three is Jaws [1975]. I think it was the first movie I remember seeing, actually. I was like five, maybe even younger, and it's just tortured me ever since. I have nightmares of sharks and I have a phobia of the ocean. • Number four is The Hustler [1961]. I'm a huge pool fan and I saw The Color of Money when I was younger, not realizing that it was the later years of Fast Eddie. I checked out The Hustler and, not being smart enough to understand that they were connected, I was like, 'Wait a minute!' • And number five is Fight Club [1999]. I love it because I think it has a real spiritual message to it. It really pisses me off when people say, 'I can't

watch it, it's too violent,' because it's not about the violence, you know? It's about a whole generation of disenfranchised men who can't find their way in society."

#### SOUNDS LIKE YOUR IDOLS ARE THE ICONS LIKE BRANDO AND NEWMAN.

"Yeah, definitely. I started acting in high school and my dad rented *On the Waterfront* and *East of Eden* for me and those movies changed my life, just in terms of the way I viewed acting.... You can have a great story and special effects and all that stuff but great acting is something in and of itself. So you have Robert Shaw in *Jaws*, and Paul Newman, George C. Scott, definitely Marlon Brando and James Dean...and Jack Nicholson can just blow me away."

#### DO YOU THINK WE HAVE ACTORS OF THAT CALIBER TODAY?

"I think Sean Penn is certainly the closest. I think he and Al Pacino are carrying that torch. And Benicio Del Toro, who I'm a huge fan of. But other than that I don't see much hope in the younger generation right now."

#### YOU CO-STARRED WITH COLIN FARRELL IN *TIGERLAND* — DID YOU KNOW THEN THAT HE WAS GOING TO BREAK OUT THE WAY HE HAS?

"No, no. We were all thinking that what happened to Colin was going to happen to us because [director] Joel Schumacher has this ability to pluck young actors out of nowhere and all of a sudden they're working all over the place.... So we were way too self-involved to think about it happening to Colin."

#### BELOW IS YOUR THIRD WAR FLICK. WHAT'S WITH THE WAR FETISH?

"(Laughs.) I'm certainly trying to stay away from that. *Pearl Harbor* didn't really count because I'm in the movie for about two seconds. It's hard to say, because if you find a really great script and there are actors who are working on it who you love...if they were to make a *Thin Red Line* tomorrow and someone said 'Jim Caviezel, Sean Penn and Terry Malick are in this movie, would you be a part of it?' I would definitely say yes."

#### WHAT MAKES *BELOW* DIFFERENT FROM ALL THE SUBMARINE MOVIES WE'VE SEEN?

"I think it defies the submarine genre because the acting in it is great. We've got a really great ensemble cast, the set design is phenomenal and our director David Twohy really captured a strong element of fear that goes along with the story."

#### BLUE CRUSH MUST HAVE BEEN FUN TO DO.

"It came at a perfect time because after September 11th everything just slowed down. It just seemed like such a fun movie to be a part of. I got to work in Hawaii, I got to learn how to surf and I got paid. It was a perfect experience and a needed experience given the time in the world."

"Oooh... that's a tough one. I'd bet on me but he is bigger than I am so it's hard to say."






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
